MILLER ELECTED PRESIDENT OF S. R. C.

Eileen Crotty Elected as President of Ladies Society

Re-election to Be Held For Other Positions

Wednesday morning saw two-thirds of the student body casting their votes in the annual S.R.C. elections for next year's executive. The president of the S.R.C. and of the Ladies' Society were the only positions decided in Wednesday's balloting, and another election for the vice-president, treasurer and secretary of the S.R.C. will be held in the near future.

R. Bruce Miller, popular Pre-Medical student will head the S.R.C. during the next scholastic year. A "North Shore" man Bruce hails from Campbellton, and has shown a great interest in campus activities since coming to U.N.B. in the fall of '40. This year he has served on the executive of the S.R.C. as treasurer. In his Sophomore year he was secretary of his class, and secretary of the Pre-Med Society, in which he has taken a very active part. A hard-working campaigner for the Blood Donation organization for the past two years, Bruce is the mainstay of that group at present. Another of his favorite activities is the Glee Club, of which he was secretary-treasurer last year. And to top these activities, he has shown an active interest in C.O.T.C. and now holds the rank of sergeant. Known and liked by every student, this popular Junior is a most capable man for the most responsible position on the campus.

Candidates for the position of vice-president of the S.R.C. are Colin Ramsey and Dave Whittingham; for treasurer, Gordon Simpson and Jim Fettes; and for secretary, Frank Dohane and Norwood Carter.

Eileen Crotty succeeded in winning a close election over Joyce Mavor and Mary Murray. Eileen has been very active in her three years on the campus. In her Freshman year she was Vice-President of her class. This year she is Proof Editor of the Brunswickan, a member of the S.R.C. and also is one of the hardest and most consistent workers on the Year Book staff. COLLECT YOUR DIVIDENDS

This week the Science Book Club is returning dividends on all books purchased by students during the present college year. Therefore this is probably an opportune time to give something of the history of the club, how it operates, and on what basis these dividends are declared.

The Book Department was first founded by members of the Science Club about six years ago, and for some time served only the Science faculty. Later it began to serve the Arts faculty as well, and this year it was extended still further to the Forestry faculty, as well as to books used by the Freshman class.

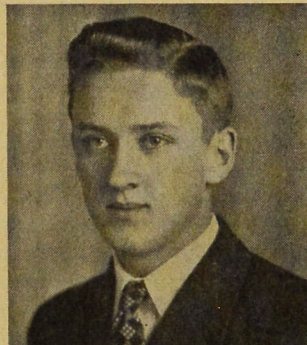
Through most of its history the book club has had difficulty in obtaining recognition with the publishers as a legitimate book retailer, eligible for dealer's discount. Even at the present time such difficulties are occasionally encountered, but most of them have been ironed out, and the club is now in a position to give much better service than formerly.

The books you have purchased from the club during the year were sold to you at the list price quoted by the publisher, with customs and exchange added for books from the U.S. The discount that we received from the publisher was used to pay such things as express charges, stamps, and other incidentals, as well as the manager's salary. The money left after these expenses were paid, is being returned to you as dividends at the rate of 12%, the highest in the history of the club.

Students Urge Formation Student - Faculty Board

Some progress was made during the past week in the formation of a University Selective Service Board at U.N.B. Spirited discussion of the subject at Friday's S.R.C. meeting centred on the purpose of such a board and the status of the Arts course. The plan outlined at the University of Toronto was considered and the applicability of many of the suggestions to U.N.B. caused considerable debate.

Saturday a student committee comprising Marjorie Dickson, Arnold McAllister, Herbert Loane, Bruce Miller and Bernard Power met with President MacKenzie to present the student's reaction. Dr. that a greater interchange of ideas MacKenzie expressed the opinion between the faculty and students would benefit the university. He suggested that the faculty and student committees meet in the near future to discuss creating a combined student-faculty board.

Campus Book Store Taking Shape

A Campus Book Store Committee composed of Professor Fleiger, Dr. Toole, Dr. Turner, Mrs. Thompson, Ken Carrol, Arnold McAllister and Bernard Downman met Wednesday, March 17th to consider the formation of a central book store.

Such a store, as discussed by the committee, would be located in the Librarian's office. An assistant Librarian would have to be appointed, who would manage the book store and also act as part-time assistant in the Library. The possibility of handling second-hand books was also brought up.

Biggest drawback is the Science Book Club and the Engineering Society's Store, as those two would have to surrender their rights.

Another meeting is to be held next Wednesday, March 24th for further considerations after the Engineering Society and Science Club have made their decisions.

The following seems to be the final results of the publication of the Commerce Issue of the McGill Daily.

The McGill Daily, banned February 19, following the appearance of its 'blatantly smutty' Commerce Issue resumed publication on Monday, March 8, by permission of the Senate of McGill University.

The Daily will publish three more issues this year operating under the direction of its 1943-44 Editorial Board, appointed Thursday, March 4.

The new Board came into office approximately a week sooner than scheduled when Stewart Willis, president of the Students' Society, accepted the resignation of Editor-in-Chief Raymond Ayoub and the resignations of News Editor Munroe, Managing Editor Joseph and C.U.P. Editor MacIntosh, which soon followed.

Lifting of the Senate ban upon publication of the Daily follows action by the Students' Executive in presenting to the Committee on Morals and Discipline of the Senate a report placing the blame for the objectionable contents of the Commerce Issue upon the students immediately concerned, and suggesting disciplinary action ranging from conduct probation to suspension in each case.

Action has been taken along the same lines as the McGill Students' Council by the Students' Council of the University of Alberta.

The Students' Council of the University of Alberta has banned the next year's edition of the Engineers' Gateway and a humour column, the "Casserole".

"Casserole" has appeared in the columns of the Gateway for the past twenty years, during which time it has been the centre of controversy many times. It was one of the most popular of college paper humour columns.

The present ban was brought on by a page of humour appearing in the Engineers' edition of the Gateway and the council felt that "humour of such a nature did not represent the majority of the student body."

S. C. M. MEETING

The weekly meeting of the S. C. M. was held on Sunday evening in the Y.M.C.A. rooms with President Purnell in the chair. The devotional period was conducted by Eileen Wallace, who spoke briefly on the importance of performing small duties and acts of kindness. The business centred around plans for two functions, the Freshman S.C.M. Variety Concert for March 26, 27 and a dinner dance.

Mr. Shanks, local Secretary of the Y.M.C.A. spoke on the work of the "Y", both in Canada and in the world. He related some of his own experiences with the "Y" and gave an enlightening talk on the organizational and historical background
