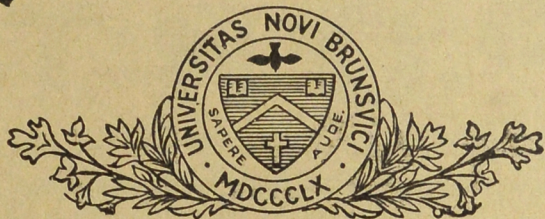

M. I. D. L. LAYS PLANS FOR DEBATING

To suggest reforms in Maritime debating and to draw up a schedule of debates for 1943-44, the Maritime Intercollegiate League held its annual meeting at St. Francis Xavier University on Wednesday, October 20. The delegates present took part in a radio forum on state hospitalization and were entertained at a semi-formal dance.

Representatives from eight Maritime universities were at the conference: W. Hall, Acadia; S. Gordon, Dalhousie; E. Shields, Kings; D. Anderson, Mount Allison; T. Kerr, St. Francis Xavier; R. Power, St. Marys; B. Losier, M. LeBlanc, St. Thomas; N. Carter, U. N. B. The president and secretary of the conference were A. MacEackin and M. MacLean respectively, both of St. F. X.

It was decided that each college should take part in three M.I.D.L. debates. U.N.B.'s schedule follows: Mt. Allison at U.N.B., November 19; U.N.B. at Dalhousie, February 15, and Acadia at U.N.B., February 15. A trophy will be awarded to the col-

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C. O. T. C. Is 'Plenty Tough'

"Training, training, and --- training is what the C.O.T.C. is doing this year," stated Capt. McCormack, chief instructor of the U.N.B. Contingent, C.O.T.C., in an interview with the Brunswickan. A syllabus of training, similar to that which was carried out last year, is being followed. Each of the two companies has three afternoon parades a week, and often has a week-end parade of five hours' duration.

The drill includes training in rifle, bayonet, grenades, the two-inch mortar, Bren gun, Lewis gun, map reading, and other military subjects.

The cadets are divided into "A" and "B" Companies and six platoons. The Freshman group, "B" Company, take during the year the first month basic army training. Second year cadets take the second month of basic training. In their

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"Inter-provincial University"—Walker

Halifax, October 18.—(CUP)—It was recently suggested by Dr. A. Stanley Walker, president of the University of King's College, that an attempt be made to establish an inter-provincial university in the Maritimes after the war. This suggestion was presented in a brief before the Royal Commission on Provincial Development and Post-War Rehabilitation.

The brief suggested that all universities in the three provinces would retain their present locations and staffs, but would be "grouped" around the central Government-administered and supported institution.

Grants Go To Biology Dept.

Due to generous donations of money from two different sources the Biology Department has greatly augmented its supply of books. Last spring generous donations were received.
