FINAL FALL BUDGET MEETING SEES FEW CHANGES

S. R. C. Passes Proposal To Purchase \$200. Bond

Lacking the traditional heated arguments and the hoped for crowd, the Fall Budget slid past the S. R. C. for final approval Wednesday night.

Not more than thirty spectators braved the blowing rain to follow the budget through its final stages of legislation and they, together with their representatives, remained tight lipped during the whole meeting.

A rink budget was submitted but as the rink manager failed to make his appearance it was set over until a later date.

Members unanimously decided that 200 dollars should be invested in Victory Bonds in an effort to boost the Fifth Victory Loan.

The main business of the meeting was brought to a close, with the voting of thirty dollars to "Shorty" Clark for his services as assistant coach of the football team.

The other items dealt with included the election of Blake O'Brien to the management of the Football Team and the appointment of John MacCullum as Vice President of the S.R.S. by acclamation.

Peace in 1947 Says Dr. Brace

"Another year to finish Hitler, another one to finish Japan, and perhaps a year after that will see victory for us."

That was the opinion of Dr. A. J. Brace as he spoke to the history students of the University last Thursday in the history room, about modern China.

Dr. Brace is former professor of modern history at the University of Cheng Tu in the interior of China, was also national secretary for the Y.M.C.A. there. He spent twenty-five years of his life in the east and is now stationed in Toronto.

His talk concerned China of today, telling us of the fine spirit and His talk was illustrated with slides of China, giving a fine insight into great dexterity of the Chinese, the work of the people and the army origination.

Arriving from Ottawa last Saturday, Dr. J. Richards Petrie has returned to Fredericton after an absence of about two years. He has joined the faculty of the University of New Brunswick, and will lecture on Economics and Politics. His lectures begin this coming Monday.

Dr. Petrie was attached to the University staff for a short time in 1941, when he supplied for Professor B. S. Keirstead. During his former stay in Fredericton he was an Economist with the Provincial Government. Then he was loaned by the New Brunswick Government to Ottawa, where he worked with the Department of Lands and Mines. This position he had to resign recently because of ill health.

Dr. Petrie graduated from Saint John High School, and then entered the University of New Brunswick. He graduated from U.N.B. in 1930 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. (Continued on page five)
