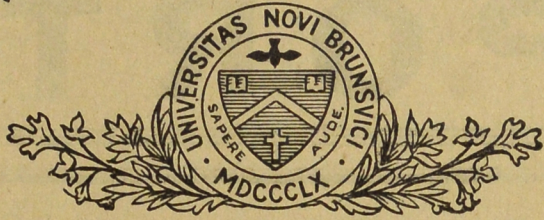

Books and Materials Needed for Prisoners

The problem of I. S. S. relief should be one of the greatest interest to every student. However, this does not seem to be the case on our campus. Many of the students do not even know what I. S. S. means, and we feel that they should have an opportunity to hear about it.

Petition Re Refugee Entry

A petition, circulated by the Canadian National Committee on Refugees through the University Students Committees on Refugees has reached this campus and is to be sponsored by the Students Christian Movement and the International Relations Club.

The petition calls for the existing restrictions on entry into Canada concerning race, creed, and financial conditions be lifted in the case of any bona-fide refugees from political or religious persecution. It is the aim of the National Committee to secure 500,000 signatures to send to the government to stimulate the government to make a serious investigation of the refugee problem.

The university movement was organized in the University of Toronto and has been carried to most of the Upper Canadian campuses in the past few weeks. At McGill more than 600 students signed during the first week of circulation although the subject was a matter of much debate. There are over 400 petitions circulating on the campus of the University of Toronto where the president, Dr. Cody, has taken an active interest.

Mr. K. B. Sandwell, the editor of "Saturday Night" has addressed Student bodies at both Toronto and Montreal and has pointed out to them that Canada has admitted only 15,000 refugees since the beginning of the war while Great Britain, when engaged in a life and death struggle, admitted more than (Continued on page five)

I.S.S. stands for International Student Service, an organization to give aid to students who have suffered from the effects of war to the extent that they are unable to continue with their studies without help. The I.S.S. supplies books and materials to students in war camps, who are under great mental strain and very much in need of a chance to study.

The Red Cross cares for the physical needs of such persons, but the I.S.S. looks after their mental needs. In one prison camp in Germany, for instance, there are over 4,000 prisoners who are students in a war camp University. If the I.S.S. did not supply these people with books and materials, they would be unable to keep their minds in a healthy state of activity.

This is where we as students do our part. The I.S.S. is supported entirely by students. If the students in the Universities do not raise the money, the I.S.S. will be unable to help these people. Surely, this is a type of war effort that should appeal to students. When we compare the difficulties of getting an education in foreign countries today with our own petty troubles, we cannot help but be anxious to help them. Such students have undergone great privations (Continued on page five)

"All Out Aid is Needed For China", Says Dr. Endicott

"We must help Chiang-Kai-Shek to form a democracy in China after the war." This was the statement made by Dr. J. G. Endicott as he spoke to the C.O.T.C. and the U.A. T.C. last Monday afternoon in the Memorial Hall.

Dr. Endicott is one of the leading missionary statesmen of today, having spent several years in the Orient as a missionary and as professor of English in one of the colleges there. He spoke of the lack of supplies which the Chinese are encountering and stated that we should aid China as much as possible.

Speaking of the building of the Burma Road, Dr. Endicott affirmed that the malaria which accompanied its construction carried off over 70,000 people. Men, women and children worked on the Road with their own tools and put it through in eight months when engineers said it would take eighteen.

Throughout his speech, Dr. Endicott gave striking illustrations of the conditions prevailing today in China and the need for the democracies to help in the unification and reconstruction when the war is won.
