but drew a distinction between actions in his personal and professional lives. In addition, Campbell declined to call drunk driving — considered a petty

misdemeanour in Hawaii — a criminal act, preferring to describe it as a "terrible mistake."

In a statement, the Liberal caucus voiced strong support for Campbell's leadership. Deputy Premier and

Minister of Education Christy Clark, one of four Liberal Party legislators who attended the press conference, said Campbell is still the person she wants to lead her party into the next election. Clark also avoided calling Campbell's actions a criminal act.

"Certainly this is a terrible personal mistake that he's made, but I stand behind him," said Clark.

New Democratic Party leader Joy MacPhail and Green Party leader Adriane Carr, however, are calling for Campbell to step down. According to MacPhail, the Premier's decision to keep his post makes him a hypocrite. Furthermore, MacPhail maintains Campbell has lost the "moral authority" to govern the province.

A lone protester awaited reporters leaving the press conference at Canada Place. Braeden Caley, a grade 11 student at Richmond Secondary School, said the Premier should resign.

"There's certain expectations you have as a leader and certain expectations you have as a role model — and he's broken both of them," Caley said.

"Saying it's okay because he's on vacation is ridiculous. If someone comes here on vacation and kills someone drunk driving, no one is going to say, it's okay, he's on vacation."

Intersession in Rome promises new experiences for willing students

All roads lead to Rome. Italy, that is. Tired of the same old rigmarole of classes? Interested in spicing things up a bit?

If you answered yes to either of those questions then Intersession in Rome may be the adventure for you.

Through Intersession in Rome, students will gain more than just credits towards their degree. All participants will get the ultimate Rome experience.

They will be taught how to live as the Romans do including how to ride buses, order cappuccino and meals, and generally get around the city on their own.

In the past, students have typically spent six hours of their day in classes, with a three hour class each in the morning and afternoon. Students who are worried about spending a large chunk of the day in classes should not be deterred. Virtually all of the classes will be taught on location in piazzas, museums, galleries, churches, archaeological sites, among others.

Students are also encouraged to explore Rome on their own and although costs for extra-curricular

activities are not included in the cost, students are urged to attend cultural, religious or sporting events. The staff will assist in making arrangements and, in some cases, will go along to provide information and guidance.

Fourth year history honours student, Mark McLaughlin urges other students to go to Rome.

"I found the trip to Rome to be extremely valuable, since it allowed me to live where history was created. You learn about such characters as Mussolini and the Caesars of Ancient Rome but to actually stand where they once stood takes the experience to a whole new level. You gain a new appreciation for who they were and what they did. You feel connected with them on a certain level."

Intersession in Rome is not only an excellent way to get hands on experience with history, but participants also get to meet a number of new people. McLaughlin comments:

"The Intersession trip was a great way to meet lots of interesting people from across Canada. Plus, it allowed me to become an Italian for three weeks. All combined, it was the most amazing experience of my life."

NEW METHADONE TREATMENT DOWNTOWN

The new UNB Faculty of Nursing's downtown clinic has started using Methadone treatment for drug addicts. The controversial treatment replaces an abused drug with Methadone and eventually patients are weaned off Methadone which is less addictive.

The clinic has a waiting list of 20 with the maximum 20 already beginning the treatment.

Methadone costs only five dollars a day, compared to \$700 a day for heroin or dilaudid.

Patients enrolled in the program must attend counseling and are subject to random urine tests.

They began treatments this past Friday.

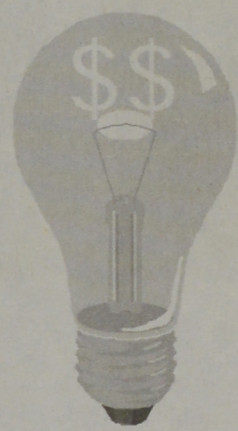
New Methadone clinic open in Community Health Centre
