A terrible accident on the Canada Atlantic railway occurred at St. Polycarpe on Wednesday morning last. The train was composed of a locomotive, tender and seven cars. The train was going at a very fast speed when the engine and first two cars left the track, five persons were killed and a number seriously injured. St. Poly Carpe is a junction station of the Canadian Pacific and Canada Atlantic Railways and forty one miles from Montreal. The dead are Joseph Canig of Ottawa. The cause of the accident is not exactly known but it is supposed that the speed of the train was excessive for the track.

Daniel Lamb son of the late Capt Lamb, of Diligent River N, S. died at Whitehall on Wednesday of last week from injuries received by falling into the hold of barge No 3 off Eastport, Me. The deceased was 21 years old and the only child of a wid wed mother for whom much sympathy is helt.
