MIDDLEBURY, Vt., Aug. 15.--Last even ing a man named Eastwood hired a team here and went to East Middlebury, a short distance from here, to the residence of his wife, who lived with her mother there, and shot his wife and her mother, killing both. He then rapidly drove back to this town, went to the residence of Frank Fenn, driver of a team for Marshall & Co., and deliberately shot him through the heart. He next fired at the murdered man's wife but did not kill her, the bullet grazing her head. He then went to the residence of E D Brown, brother of his wife and tried to find Mr Brown, evidently with the intention of shooting him. Eastwood has not been seen or heard of here since.
