

Should what had fallen from him be thought worthy of observation by any Noble Lord, it was probable he might be told in reply, that he was earnestly recommending humiliation to the country. He felt himself, however, bound to maintain, that the language of peace in the hour of victory, afforded no proof of humiliation. The general opinion, he was convinced, went decidedly in a contrary way; for when could the country have a more favourable opportunity of making just and honourable terms, than at the present moment? With regard to the diminution of expence, it was unquestionably a most material object; but he entertained strong doubts on that head, for when the diminution of expence was originally announced as on the point of taking place, that assurance proved in the event an absolute increase of expence. When a Noble Lord confidently declared, that their Lordships were willing to pursue the line of conduct pointed out to them in his Majesty's speech, he really believed the declaration, for he felt that there existed in that House a great spirit for war. It was, indeed, a martial spirit, and very likely to continue. In that respect their Lordships had the advantage, that they were continually supplied with fresh recruits in the House to carry it on with vigour.

The King has been graciously pleased to give and grant unto the Right Hon. Horatio Baron Nelson of the Nile, and of Burnham Thorpe, in the County of Norfolk, Rear-Admiral of the Blue Squadron of his Majesty's Fleet, and Knight of the most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, in consideration of the great zeal, courage, and perseverance manifested by him upon divers occasions, and particularly of his able and gallant conduct in the glorious and decisive victory obtained over the French Fleet near the Mouth of the Nile, on the 1st day of August last, his Royal License and authority, that he and his issue may bear the following honourable augmentations to his armorial ensigns, viz. A Chief undulated Argent, thereon waves of the sea, from which a palm tree issuant, between a disabled ship, on the dexter, and a ruinous battery, on the sinister, all proper; and for his Crest, on a Naval Crown, Or, the Chequy, or Plume of Triumph, presented him by the Grand Signior, as a mark of his high esteem, and of his sense of the gallant conduct of the said Horatio Baron Nelson, in the said glorious and decisive victory; with the motto, "PALMAM QUI MERUIT FERAT;" and to his Supporters, being a Sailor on the dexter, and a Lion on sinister, the honourable augmentations following, viz. in the hand of the Sailor a Palm Branch, and another in the Paw of the Lion, both proper, with the addition of a tri-coloured Flag and Staff in the Mouth of the latter; which augmentations to the supporters to be borne by the said Horatio Baron Nelson, and by those to whom the said dignity shall descend in virtue of his Majesty's Letters Patent of Creation; and that the same may be first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office:

And also to order, that his Majesty's said Concession, and especial mark of his Royal Favour, be registered in his College of Arms.

LATEST of BUONAPARTE.

NEW-YORK, Jan. 18.

Captain Odlin, of the Brig Sea Nymph from Gibraltar, in sixty days, brings intelligence, that the day before he sailed his Britannic Majesty's ship Colossus, had arrived there from Naples with the information of a very severe engagement having taken place at Alexandria, in Egypt, between the Turks and the French, in which the former were victorious, though with the loss of Seventeen Thousand Men; and that Buonaparte and his army were entirely destroyed.

On the 21st of October, four sail of the line, and fourteen transports with 8,000 men, sailed from Gibraltar, on a secret expedition. It was supposed with an intention of taking Malta.

Since writing the above, the Editor of the Mercantile Advertiser made considerable exertions to find out Capt. Odlin, that he might learn from him, if possible, the particulars of an event so important in the politics of Europe, and so materially interesting to all civilized society.—In Capt. Odlin, the Editor recognized an old and esteemed friend, who favoured him with the following statement for publication, with an assurance that it might be depended on as authentic.

On Sunday the 11th November, Captain Odlin dined at the house of Messrs. Robert Anderson, & Co. of Gibraltar, in company with Judge Morrison of the Court of Vice Admiralty of Gibraltar, who informed the company, that Earl St. Vincent had informed him, that the British ship of war the Colossus, which arrived the day preceding from Naples, brought dispatches from Admiral NELSON, at Naples, to Earl St. Vincent, which contained information of the Turks having attacked the army of Buonaparte with a formidable force consisting of 200,000 men.

At the commencement of the action, the French demanded quarters. This being refused them by the Turks, the French had no alternative, and they fought like mad men. The carnage was dreadful on both sides. The Turks lost 17,000 men, and of the French only 400 escaped by flight.

What was the fate of "the Hero of Italy" himself; whether he was amongst the fallen or fugitives, had not transpired.

The French ships which had arrived at Gibraltar were shattered like honey combs.—The Expedition from England, arrived there about the 10th October, under the command of Sir Sidney Smith, and sailed from thence in great haste on the 21st.—The fleet consisted of four sail of the line and fourteen transports, having eight thousand men on board. Its destination was, by some, supposed to be for Malta, and by others for Minorca. It was seen three days afterwards, beating to windward, with an Easterly wind. In consequence of this expedition, all the merchantmen were debarred from a supply of water.

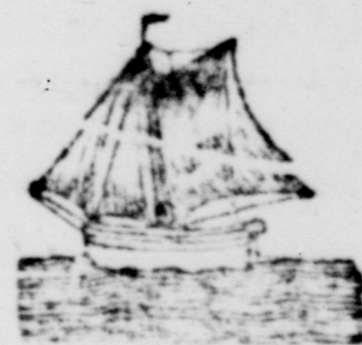
