

very ill fed, and with only brack-
er to drink, gained them the vic-
tory of the whole Ottoman Army.

PORTSMOUTH, March 21.
Sailed the Calcutta, Dover, and U-
lysses, men of war, with 2000 of the
guards for Ireland.

DEAL, March 21.
A sudden order has been received
here to stop the embarkation of the
troops until farther orders. The 17th
regiment were to have embarked this
morning, had they not received counter-
orders. The 40th have received similar
orders. It is said the troops will be
disembarked.

GLASGOW, March 25.
We are still without news of any
importance. Ten Hamburg mails are
now due, and no intelligence has been
received from France since our last.

On Wednesday, the embarkation of
the troops to be employed in the new
expedition, commenced at Deal, when
the 1st battalion of the 35th regiment,
were shipped on board the Stately
and Alkmaer men of war, and the 2d
battalion on Thursday, but the embar-
cation it is said, has been put a stop to
till farther orders. Two detachments
of the Guards, consisting of about 2000
men, have sailed from Portsmouth for
Ireland.

March 29.
Paris papers to the 20th inst. were
received on Wednesday. It would ap-
pear from a postscript to a Genoeze Ga-
zette of the 1st March, that hostilities
have recommenced in Italy, in the en-
virons of Genoa. An article from Leg-
horn states that Klenau was advancing
rapidly against Genoa, followed by Gen.
Ott's corps of 20,000 men and seconded
by the insurgents of Fontanna-buona.

The campaign has not yet com-
menced on the Rhine. The Russian troops
under the command of General Lasney,
have quitted their cantonment in Wal-
thynia, and are on their march to Riga,
where they are to be embarked.

Tuesday's Gazette contains accounts
of the capture of 5 large privateers.

FALMOUTH, (Jam.) April 2.

On Sunday after noon arrived at this
port, the Spanish Selucca privateer Bar-
thelemy, late Capt. Rosso, rowing 18
sweeps, mounting two carriage guns,
2 pounders, with 25 muskets, 6 bayonets,
17 cutlasses, and some ammunition.
She is one of the privateers that have so
much annoyed this coast, and lately
captured a shallop belonging to the
Hebe, of Bristol, with eight punche-
ons of rum; since which, she proved
a Scotch prize to the copper-bottomed
cutter Vigilant, manned with volunteers
at Black River, and went out to take
and bring her in; soon after which she
captured the cutter Annabella, Capt.
Huffey, from Kingston, with 130 new
negroes, bound from Savanna-la-Mar;
with the latter she returned to Trinidad,
where the slaves and prizes were sold;
the share to each man, for a cruise of
only 4 weeks upon this coast, amount-
ed to 700 dollars. Thus successful she
was, with several more privateers, fitted
out for another cruise, and was to have
sailed last Friday for her former station,
Black River and Savanna-la-Mar, there
to have joined other privateers to cut
out the ship Sir Godfrey Webster,
Capt. Spencer, of London, now load-
ing at Black River.—Fortunately six
Brave British Seamen, John Taylor,
late master of the drogger Bessy Duncan;
James Linzell, second mate of the ship
Hebe; William Woodrofe, mate of the
cutter Annabella; John Smith,
Paul Jones, and a free sailor negro, na-
med James Rose, prisoners at Trinidad,
(in the habit of drinking, and being
much with the crew of the Barthelemy)
knowing the situation of the vessel at
night, and mostly on shore drunk, de-
termined on cutting her out. On Wed-
nesday night last, at 8 P.M. the six
British Tars above stated, took the op-
portunity (while some of the crew were
on board the Annabella, her prize,
nearly alongside, drinking, and the rest
on shore, at a fandango) to get on
board the privateer, and having obtain-
ed full possession of the vessel, arms,
&c. they determined on bending the
sails, cutting the cable, and putting to
sea; but they soon found there were
no sails on board; upon a discovery,
however, the sails were in the cutter
Annabella, they went on board her,
got the Spaniards drunk, secured them
all below, brought the sails on board

the privateer, bent them, and with the
assistance of some water, rum, and pro-
visions, from an American ship that
lay at a little distance, those jolly Tars,
in an enemy's port, where there are
forts, and an armed Spanish packet of
20 guns and 100 men, laying only half
a mile from them, made sail in the mid-
dle of a dark squally night, in a dan-
gerous navigation, after the misfortune
of running upon one of the reefs, by
 dint of labour and exertion (trifling ob-
jects to British seamen) they brought
the vessel safe off, without spilling one
drop of blood.—At 10 A.M. on Satur-
day, seeing a British man of war to lea-
ward of them they ran down under her
stern; the Captain asked them a few
questions, sent one of his Lieutenants
on board, and upon examining the peo-
ple, said they were brave fellows, of-
fered them a compass, water and pro-
visions, and told them to make sail af-
ter him, and he would tow them in
with the land, which they did. They
do not recollect the name of the man of
war but think it was the Trent.

The sailors that brought in this Selu-
ca, report that a large canoe, with one
gun, 27 men, with small arms, &c.
failed two days before them, for the
West-End, which is one of those that
are to make the attempt in cutting out
the Godfrey Webster; and so certain
are they of succeeding, that they have
already bargained with their agents at
Trinidad for the ship.

FROM THE MEDITERRANEAN.

On Saturday last arrived in the Outer
Harbour the ship Favourite, Captain
Ellery, from Malaga, via Gibraltar, 32
days from the latter place, by which
we have received the following infor-
mation.

A letter from a house of the first respec-
tability at Gibraltar, dated March
31st 1800, informs,

That, "affairs in Italy have rather a
favourable aspect," and it is probable
more of that country will be freed from
the French this Summer than was ex-
pected.

"The remains of the army of Egypt,
(late Buonaparte's) have capitulated
with the Turks, and are to be sent home,
and not to serve again during the war.
The return of these people to France
will be of no service to Buonaparte's
cause, as they blame him much for
leaving them."

The above important intelligence
is no more than might be anticipated
after reading the third part of *Intercepted
Letters from Egypt*, lately published in
this town, and after the abandonment
of the army in Egypt by its chief, fen-
sible of the ruin and misery that awaited
it.

"What brave men could do, no doubt
has been done, to retard or prevent the
surrender of a third part of the once
formidable army of England, and sub-
scribing to the most ignominious capi-
tulation incurred this war, that of not
serving again during the continuance
of it.

Thanks to a NELSON and a SMITH!
that the ambition and cruelty of the
worst enemies of mankind have been
punished and revenged on the same
shores where in the 13th century, Louis
9th of France, was taken prisoner, and
more than half of 60,000 men, the
flower of his Kingdom perished by the
sword and disease.

We make these remarks, because in
the opinion of our wise politicians,
10,000 modern Frenchmen were supe-
rior to 100,000 Turks. That Egypt
and Syria would fall an easy prey to the
invincible armada.—That possessing
themselves of the Red Sea, or marching
like a caravan across Persia to India,
strike a fatal blow to the English power
in the East-Indies.—That Buonaparte
might ascend the throne of the Great
Mogul, reign over the millions of Indi-
ans now subject to the British, and be
as good a Hindoo as he has been a Mus-
selman, a Catholic or a Christian.

The tale is not all told, when an in-
jured Kleber and his poor remnant army
shall reach France, truths will be told
which will make the ears of Buonaparte
tingle; nor will the splendor of a pa-
lace, the bustle of a camp, or the high
ascendancy of power make his bed a bed
of down.

The poor remains of Buonaparte's
army (it will be seen under Boston head)
has at length capitulated on the igno-
minious condition of not serving again
during the present war. When these
men return to France, they will raise
a clamour against their perfidious leader
who abandoned them, that may make
him tremble on the throne he has ur-
furped.

It is said the King of Spain has de-
clared he will not acknowledge the
Port to be elected, unless he shall pro-
test against the Emperor of Russia, who
has thought fit to make himself Grand
Master of Malta.

VALUABLE CAPTURE.

The following particulars are extracted
from the minutes of the ship Favorite,
capt. Ellery, from Gibraltar.

"On the 8th April, fell in with the
Leviathan of 74 guns, Admiral Duck-
worth, who had with him two
Spanish frigates and 7 Spanish mer-
chantmen, captured 2 days before,
bound from Cadiz to Lima. They had
been with Admiral Duckworth all the
night, preceding their capture, mistak-
ing her for one of themselves, and
did not 'till the morning discover their
error, when the two frigates were en-
gaged by the Leviathan to whom they
struck after a smart action.

The Swiftsure, Capt. Hallowell,
had been sent by the Admiral in chase
of other ships of the same convoy—
success unknown. N. Y. Pap.
