

Foreign Intelligence.

HAMBURG, September 26.

The following is the Reply of Lord Grenville to the Note of the Count de Vedel Jarlsbourg, His Danish Majesty's Minister, respecting the capture of the Freya Frigate:

"The Underigned, Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to His Majesty, has had the honor of laying before His Majesty the Note which was received yesterday from the Count de Vedel Jarlsbourg, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the King of Denmark.

"It was with the greatest surprise and concern that His Majesty received the first intelligence of the Affair to which that Note relates. Sincerely desirous of maintaining those Relations of Friendship and Alliance which have so long subsisted between Great-Britain and Denmark, His Majesty has, during the course of his Reign, given reiterated proof of that disposition, and which he sincerely hoped to have been reciprocally entertained by His Danish Majesty; and, notwithstanding the expressions contained in the Note of the Count Vedel Jarlsbourg, His Majesty cannot but flatter himself, that it was not really by the orders of the King of Denmark that this state of harmony has been so suddenly interrupted, or that a Danish Officer could have acted conformably to his instructions, in thus commencing Hostilities, by a rash and unprovoked attack upon a British Ship of War, carrying the Flag of His Majesty and navigating the British Seas.

"The impressions which such an event have necessarily made upon His Majesty, have derived greater force by the reading of a Note in which satisfaction and reparation is demanded, as due to the Aggressors, from those who have sustained the insult and the injury. His Majesty duly considering the difficult situation in which Neutral Nations are placed by the unexampled conduct and singular character of his Enemy, has upon many occasions during the present War refrained from exercising his rights, and from claiming on the part of His Danish Majesty the impartial performance of these duties of Neutrality, which he professed himself disposed to maintain. But the premeditated and open aggression which he has just sustained, cannot be passed over in the same manner. The lives of his brave Sailors have been sacrificed, the honor of his Flag has been insulted almost within sight of his own Coasts, and this procedure has been maintained by contending the indisputable rights, founded upon the most evident principles of the Rights of Nations, from which His Majesty can never depart, and the moderate exercise of which is indispensably necessary for the maintenance of the dearest interest of his Empire.

"The Underigned, in all the Reports which he has laid before His Majesty, has done ample justice to the personal dispositions which the Count de Vedel has evinced in order to prevent all cause of misunderstanding between the two Countries. He cannot then avoid pressing him to represent to his Court this affair in its true colours, to efface these false impressions, by means of which alone, a conduct so injurious to His Majesty could have been authorized (if even it ever was), and to consult the Interest of the two Countries, but especially of Denmark, by bearing testimony to the disposition with which His Majesty's Government is animated, and by recommending to his Court, in that serious manner which the importance of the affair justifies and requires, the necessity of making in this critical conjuncture, a suitable return, so that a prompt and satisfactory reply may be given to the demand which His Majesty has caused to be made at Copenhagen, both for reparation for that which has passed, and for security against the repetition of such injurious violence.

"In order to give effect to the Representations of His Majesty upon the subject, and to furnish the means of such explanations as may prevent the necessity of resorting to extremities, which His Majesty looks forward to with the greatest regret, he has charged Lord Whitworth with a Special Mission to the Court of Denmark, and this Minister will immediately set sail upon his destination. That Court can only see in that determination a new proof of

the desire with which the King is animated to reconcile the maintenance of Peace with the preservation of the fundamental rights and interests of his Empire.

It is particularly worthy of remark, and will, doubtless, be read with much satisfaction, that in almost every Irish Lottery, Fortune has presented one or more large Prizes to the gallant Sons of the Navy of Old England.—In the last Irish Lottery, the Captain and Officers of one of His Majesty's Frigates obtained the 15,000l. Prize. In that of 1797, a Twenty Thousand Pound Prize fell to the lot of a Noble Admiral. In the Irish Lottery of 1796; a young Midshipman gained 5000l. by Half an Irish Ticket. And in that of 1795, a Purser of an Indiaman won an Irish Ticket at whist, which was shortly after drawn a Prize of 10,000l. Other occurrences, in the Irish Lottery, of a very fortunate description, and which happened to several of our brave Sons of the Wave, could be adduced.—No wonder, therefore, that Lottery Clubs, for the purchase of Irish Tickets and Shares in particular, are now establishing on board numerous Ships of War and Commerce. And this with an increased avidity, since, on account of the UNION between the two Kingdoms, the present will terminate all Irish Lotteries, or in other words, this last Irish Lottery is the only opportunity, by which Capital Prizes of 20,000l. of 10,000l. of 5000l. &c. are to be obtained, for half the Price of an English Ticket.

A curious circumstance happened last market day at Croydon:—A great number of people assembled to dispose of their commodities; geese were offered for sale at 9s. butter at 14d. and every other article dear in proportion.—Just as the market had opened, the Brighton mail coachman drove into town, and told the market people that an amazing mob was within half a mile of them, whose intention it was to oblige them to sell geese at four shillings, fresh butter at twelve pence, and every other article cheap in proportion. The market folks held a consultation, and imagining that the mob would arrive before they could pack up, agreed to sell for the low prices. There was no mob, and the coachman drove off, happy at being the cause of the "knowing ones being taken in."

It is with pleasure we hear, that those gallant Veterans, the Officers of Greenwich Hospital are likely to obtain a restoration of their Half-pay, which has been hitherto stopped from them, upon their being admitted Members of that great National Institution.

Messrs. Rich, Macdonald, and Guillemard, the American Commissioners, were on Thursday introduced to Her Majesty at the Drawing Room, by Lord Grenville, and kissed hands on their return.
