

NEW-YORK, Oct. 3.

From Kingston, (Jam.) Aug. 15.
From Savannah la Mar we have received the following disagreeable intelligence:

"Last Sunday morning, off the West end, His Majesty's ship Apollo descried a Falucca privateer: It being quite calm the barge and two other boats were manned and ordered to go and attack the privateer. The barge out rowed the other boats a considerable distance and made the attempt singly to board the privateer, but was over-powered, and the barge sent adrift by the privateer. When the other two boats came up with the barge they found only one man on board, who was run through the body, lying dead; and the hat of an officer of marines very much cut and hacked. The barge's crew consisted of a 2d Lieut. a Lieut. of Marines, and 24 men; it is therefore feared that not one has survived the dreadful conflict in which they were engaged."

ISLE OF SABLE.

In consequence of a sum of money granted during the last session of the Assembly of this Province, His Excellency Sir JOHN WENTWORTH, Bart. found himself enabled to attempt establishing a settlement on this inhospitable and much-dreaded island; and Mr. JAMES MORRIS, of Beach-Hill, on the Windsor Road, (a very ingenious and enterprising man) having been induced to accept proposals which were made to him, a schooner was chartered to carry the necessary materials to the place pointed out for his residence.

On Tuesday the 6th inst. his Majesty's armed brig Earl Moira, commanded by JONES FAWSON, Esq. sailed for the island, having under her convoy the above-mentioned schooner, laden with building materials, provisions, &c. and having on board three cows, a bull—a horse, a ram, with eight sheep, several goats, pigs, and other small stock—a 12 pounder carronade, six muskets, with plenty of ammunition, and a light well-built whale-boat.

In the Earl of Moira went passengers, Mr. Morris, his wife, two apprentices, and two able men, engaged as settlers:—Another man, engaged as a seaman, went in the schooner.

Contrary winds, and the necessity of carrying an easy sail for the preservation of the cattle, prevented them from arriving at the island until the 10th inst. The wind being then to the westward, and a strong current setting to the S. E. obliged Capt. Fawson, (contrary to his intention) to anchor on the north side; which he did, about 6 P. M. close in shore, to avoid drifting on the N. E. bar.

On the 11th in the morning, an officer and twelve men were sent from the Earl Moira, to assist in hauling up the lumber, and other things which were rafted on shore:—The sheep, also, were landed; but a fresh breeze springing up at N. W. it was found impracticable to land the cattle with safety.

On the 12th, the weather being moderate, the cattle were carried on shore; and on the 13th, the provisions, and other articles were all landed in good order.

Having completed this arduous and dangerous service, in a manner infinitely more easy and expeditious than could have been expected from the advanced season, and other inconveniences: Capt. Fawson sailed from the Island on the 14th inst. leaving the whole of the adventurers, (seven in number) in good health, and spirits to encounter the fatigues incident to their situation.

After encountering a heavy gale of wind on Thursday the 15th, off Canoe, the Earl Moira arrived here on the Saturday evening following.

While on the Island, a large ship, which Capt. Fawson supposed to be the Lord Macartney, observing the people on shore, stood close in with the land; doubtless, with the humane intention of relieving those whom they had reason to suppose were poor shipwrecked mariners; but decrying the brig and schooner at anchor on the opposite side of the Island, the ship made sail, and stood off from the shore.

Capt. Fawson found one man on the Island, of the name of "King," with a wife and five children, who had been there for some months past.

On the Island is a narrow pond, nearly fifteen miles in length, and Navigable

for a vessel of nine feet draft of water.—This pond is said to contain great numbers of lobsters, and other shell-fish, besides Eels, flounders, perch, &c. and in the season, to be frequented by blue wing'd ducks, and other wild fowl, in abundance.—The upland of the Island is covered with a kind of sedge-grass, and an immense quantity of wild peas; and it is thought, that roots and vegetables, of almost every sort, might be raised there with much ease.

The Northwest and Northeast Bars, give the Island somewhat the form of a crescent; the centre of which rises to a considerable height, and may be seen in a clear day, at the distance of some leagues.

The part inhabited by Mr. Morris, and his company has, we are told, the advantage of very excellent fresh water.

King, who was found on the Island, declared, that he had seen upwards of Seventy wild horses in one drove.

Upon the whole, there can be little doubt, but that Mr. Morris, who, as we have observed before, is a man perfectly adapted to the task before him, will soon find his situation comfortable, and even pleasant, should the Government of Great-Britain think proper to second the very laudable and humane efforts of this infant Province, in supporting an establishment which we hope may long do honor to the inhabitants of Nova-Scotia.

We have been favoured with the following arrangements of Flags, and other regulations which Mr. Morris has been directed to adopt, until something more permanent and effectual, can be established.

"There will be two flag-staffs erected on the Island—one on the highest ground at the east end, and the other at the west end.

"The flag at the east end is Blue, stationary, and will be visited every week, if the weather permits;—It has a small box nailed to the staff, containing directions where a boat may be found, and at what part of the Island they may find the present settlement.

"The flag that is hoisted on the high ground at the west end of the Island has three horizontal stripes—viz.—blue, white and blue; and will be hoisted as circumstances may require: The cannon will be fired when necessary, and a good look out kept.—From this station a view of the N. W. Bar is perfectly distinct."

A LAW to amend a Law, entitled, "a Law to regulate the Public Market in the City of Saint John."

WHEREAS in and by a Law, intituled "a Law to regulate the Public Market in the City of Saint John," made and passed in the Common-Council of the said City, on the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-six, and confirmed by the Governor and Council of the Province of New-Brunswick in Council, held at Fredericton, in the same Province, on the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety-six.—It was in and by the fifth section of the same law, enacted, "That no person other than a licensed Butcher, shall cut up in the said Public Market, or in any Street in the said City, any Beef, Pork, Veal, Mutton, or Lamb, or expose the same for sale, by the joint or in pieces, less than the quarter, under the penalty of Five Shillings for each and every offence." Be it ordained and enacted, by the Mayor, Aldermen and Assistants, in Common-Council convened, That the said fifth section of the said herein-before recited Law shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

And be it further ordained, That from and after the passing of this Law, no person shall expose for sale, in any place within the said City, on the Eastern side of the harbour of the same City, other than in the Public Market-house, or the Market-slip, or on the Market-square, in King's ward; or in Queen's Market, in Queen's ward, in the same City, any fresh Beef, fresh Pork, Veal, Mutton, or Lamb, under the penalty of Ten Shillings for each and every offence.

And be it further ordained, That from and after the passing of this Law, no person other than a licensed Butcher, shall cut up in the said Public Market-house, or in the said Market-slip, or on the said Public Market-square, in King's ward, or in Queen's Market, in Queen's ward, in the same City, any Beef, Pork, Veal, Mutton, or Lamb, or expose the same for sale by the joint or in pieces less than the quarter, under the penalty of Twenty Shillings for each and every offence.

And be it further ordained, That all fines, forfeitures, and penalties, inflicted and imposed by this Law, shall and may be sued for, recovered, paid and applied in the same manner as all other penalties and forfeitures in and by the same herein-before recited Law, are directed to be recovered, sued for, paid and applied.

And be it further ordained, That the said herein-before recited Law, and every clause, matter and thing therein contained, not altered or repealed by this Law, shall remain and continue in full force, any thing herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding.
