Messrs. Yund & Brown,

We live in a day which is big with important events; events which preface the accomplishment of many of the prophecies, both as they respect the civil and religious world. In many parts of the civilized as well as uncivilized world, the pure gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, has been unwelcome news. Men could not sit under their own fig tree, and under their own vine, and worship God according to the dictates of their own conscience, without being made afraid; and in no nation under heaven is this freedom of conscience found in so high a degree as it is in our highly favoured land. But it is hoped the Lord Jehovah, is preparing the way for the general spread of the gospel throughout the world, and that an effectual door will soon be opened in all the nations of the earth.

Little do the great men and potentates of the earth think, that while they are contending with each other, dividing kingdoms and empires, and drenching the earth with the blood of the slain, they are fulfilling what the Holy Ghost has long foretold by the mouth of the prophets: "I will overturn and overturn, until he shall come whose right it is to reign." Little do the idolaters in our day think, that by the stand they are making against divine revelation, they are now, like the ancient Jews and Gentiles, who crucified the Lord of life and glory, accomplishing many important predictions of the Old and new Testament. The following is an extract of a letter from a Presbyterian to his friend in this city:—

Bourbon County, 7th Aug. 1801.

"My dear Friend,

"I am on my way to one of the greatest meetings of the kind perhaps ever known; it is on a sacramental occasion. Religion has got to such a height here, that people attend from a great distance on this occasion, I doubt not but that there will be ten thousand people, and perhaps five hundred wagons. The people encamp on the ground, and continue praising God, day and night, for one whole week, before they break up—during which time, between five hundred and a thousand fall to the ground, and lie for several hours deprived of the use of their limbs. Some come too under pungent convictions, and continue in that distressed way until they are enabled to lay hold of Jesus Christ by faith; others come too, having delightful discoveries of Christ as their Saviour, and are enabled to speak in a strain that astonishes the multitude.

I am told by eye witnesses, that Presbyterians, Baptists, and Methodist Ministers unite, break bread together in token of their christian love and fellowship, the one with the other, and are mutually striving to build up the church of Christ. Does not this preface the time being at hand when the watchmen shall see eye to eye and lift up their voices like trumpets—when many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall increase in the earth; and when God shall set watchmen upon the walls of his Christian Jerusalem, who shall not hold their peace, but cry day and night! until that time ye that make mention of the Lord keep not silent—but give him no rest until he make Jerusalem a rejoicing, and his people his glory. Miscellaneous articles from late LONDON papers, received by the ship Maryland.

Sir Henry Brown Hayes, who stood convicted since the Spring Allizes at Cork, of forcibly running away with Miss Pike, a Quaker Lady of great fortune, has received sentence of Death, to be executed on the 7th September. Sir H. little expected such a sentence or at least took no pains whatever to avoid it. Notwithstanding the annual repetition of the Advertisement, offering a reward of 500l. for his apprehension, he continued to walk for years about the city of Cork, visiting the assemblies, and other public companies, with which the gaiety of his manners always rendered him a favourite. He even declined any intercession in his favour with the family he had outraged; and, when at length apprehended, seemed careless about his defence. Sir H. B. Hayes received the honour of Knighthood from the Duke of Rutland, when his Grace made a visit of Lieutenantcy to the City of Cork about 14 years ago;—it is nearly five years since Miss Pike was forcibly carried off.

One of the fleetest race-horses ever known was Childers, who ran 7420 yards, the space of one of the New-Market Horse-couriers, in seven minutes and an half, which is at the amazing rate of more than thirty-three miles and an half in an hour. This far exceeds the celebrated contest at the New-Market Spring meeting two years since, between Hambletonian and Diamond, who ran the Beacon Course of four-miles in eight minutes and twenty seconds. But it should be recollected that Childers, Hambletonian and Diamond, all ran their matches over the Beacon, a course measuring near four miles and an half long, whereas the common, or rather the Kings plate course, falls considerably short of four miles.]

JAMAICA Aug. 15.

A melancholy accident occurred on Wednesday, on board a Danish brig lying at the West end.—Three white seamen and two negroes were sent into the hold to start some casks of water, in order to cleanse the vessel, by pumping, for the reception of a cargo, when, on opening one of the casks, four of the people were instantly, from the noxious vapour, deprived of life; and the fifth, who was at a little distance, rendered senseless; but by immediate assistance being procured, there is some hope of recovery.
