

of Schwitz would depute two of its members to Paris, to enlighten the mind of the First Consul. The Commission of Ten, established by the Government of Berne, has refused to disarm the new Bernese levies, and to restore the Helvetic Senate within the walls of their capital. It was generally asserted here yesterday, that the Bernese authorities were determined to oppose the French troops, if Bonaparte did not modify the dispositions of his Proclamation. An Admiralty express reached Plymouth on Thursday morning, ordering all the men of war lying in that port to take in stores and provisions for four months, and prepare immediately for sea.

L'Avanturiere sailed with her dispatches the same night.

PARIS, OCTOBER 18.

Private Letter.—M. Lucien Bonaparte retired to his estate at Du Pleffis, as soon as he found that calculations of prudence and motives of jealousy deprived him of the hope of being First Minister.

The report of an approaching war encreases every day, and produces a great sensation. The Consul has received with much haughtiness the remonstrances made by M. de Markow, on the subject of his hostile plans against Switzerland; but this imperious tone may conceal considerable inquietudes as to the views of different powers, and his own personal situation.

The Consul answered M. de Markow in these terms:—"I had rather fall by nobly daring than by an excess of timidity."

The Counsellors of State, Susanne and Bernadotte, continuing to be absent from the council of State without having functions in the departments in which they reside, it is reported they are in complete disgrace, and that they have received orders to stay away from Paris until it shall be thought proper to recall them.

Orders have been given for repairing the Castle of Versailles. The head quarters of the Legion of Honour will be established at Fontainebleau.

The burning of the Corn Hall has produced the greatest consternation at Paris. There were in this magazine 8000 sacks of flour, a great part of which is buried beneath the ruins of the dome, which fell in when one half of the building was untouched. We dare not repeat all the conjectures of the populace respecting this event.

The Consul has had Mass said every Sunday since he has been at St. Cloud, and every time he appoints those who are to accompany him. All smile at his devotion, but yet are solicitous of the honour. He has not yet dared to render this Mass quite similar to that of the King, by forming a Chapel Orchestra, but this attempt will pass with others more important which are preparing, in order to real-life his pretensions to Sovereignty and its prerogatives.

A certain preacher held forth at St. Mary's, in Paris, without giving his auditory any satisfaction. Santeuil, the Latin poet, who was present, said, *he did better last year.* A bye-stander asserted he must be mistaken; for the present pulpit-thumper had not preached last year. *That is the very reason,* said the poet.

A LAW to regulate the RATES of CARTAGE in certain cases, on the East side of the Harbour of the City of SAINT JOHN.

BE IT ENACTED by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, in Common Council convened, That the following and no greater rates or prices of Cartage shall be taken by the licensed Carmen of this City, viz.—From the Market-Slip or Public Landing, or any of the Wharves to the North side of Saint James's-Street, for a single load of Wood, containing a Quarter of a Cord, or for twelve Bushels of Coals, Potatoes, or other articles measured by the Bushel, to any part of Water-Street, to the South-side of Union-Street, beyond Robert James's house, to any part of Prince William-Street down as far as Duke-Street, to Mr. Nicholas Hardenbrook's house, to any part of King-Street below Germain-Street, and to every place within those limits, Seven Pence Half-Penny. And to any other part of King-Street and that part of Germain-Street North of the Church, Nine Pence; to any other part of King-Street not already described, Ten Pence; to any part of Queen's Ward North of St. James's-Street, and to that part of St. James's-Street West of Germain-Street, Eleven Pence; to any other part of Queen's Ward and all Duke's Ward, One Shilling; and to any part of Sidney Ward, One Shilling.

And be it further enacted, That if any Carman or owner of Carts, shall ASK, DEMAND, or RECEIVE, from any person or persons, any other or greater RATES or FARE than is above allowed and prescribed, he or they shall forfeit and pay the Sum of TEN SHILLINGS to the use of the Poor of the Parish of Saint John.
