ment on current Events. III. Fair and free Discussions
of the measures of Government, whether relating to For-
eign Affairs, Colonies, Commerce, Manufactures, Re-
venue, Debts, Expenditures, Laws, Civil, Military, or Ec-
clesiastical. On these various and important subjects the
Work already contains such Information as the Editor is
led to hope has been of some service to the Country. Nor
are Transactions, of a nature not so immediately Politi-
cal, excluded from notice; as in the Instances of the Let-
ters to Sir Joseph Banks and Mr. Otto. In short, every
thing which materially affects, directly or indirectly, the
