The News from Canada, receiv-
ed last week, is of a most interesting
nature.—By a General Order in-
serted this day, it will be seen that a
hard fought engagement took place
near the Falls of Niagara on the 25th
ult. which terminated favorably to
His Majesty's arms, notwithstanding
the great superiority of the enemy on
the onset of the action.—We may
soon expect news of the greatest mo-
ment from the sea-coast of the Uni-
ted States, as by the last advices from
thence, British troops are said to have
landed on the east end of Long Is-
land, no doubt preparatory to an at-
tack on one of the Eastern States.

AT a meeting of the Catholic Inhabitants
of the City of Saint John, on the 21st inst. it
was resolved, that the thanks of that meeting

Saint John, and Halifax, for their liberal sub-
scriptions towards building a Catholic Church,

CAPTURE OF EASTPORT.

Com. Hardy, by Proclamation, invited the
inhabitants to take the following oath of alle-
giance, or quit the Island with their property
in seven days:

"I swear that I will bear true allegiance to
King George 3d, of the United Kingdom of G.
Britain and Ireland, and to his heirs or suc-
cessors; and that I will not, directly or indirectly,
bear arms against him, his heirs or successors, ei-
ther by sea or land. So help me God."

We learn that Brig. Gen. Brewer, has
communicated to his Excellency the Com-
mander in Chief the following letter from the
British Commandant in New-Brunswick:—

St. Andrews, 12th July, 1814.
SIR—I am directed by his Excellency
Lieut. General Sir JOHN SHERBROOKE,
to make the following communication to the
inhabitants of Robinstown, and elsewhere on
the main land:

That the object of the British Government
is to obtain possession of the Islands of Passa-
maquoddy Bay, in consequence of their being
considered within our boundary line:—That
they have no intention of carrying on offensive
operations against the people residing on the
continent, unless their conduct should oblige
us to resort to the measure; and in the event
of their remaining quiet, they will not be dis-
turbed either in their property or persons. I
have the honor to be your most obedient hum-
ble servant,

Landing of the Enemy on Long Island.

A letter from Hartford, of the 4th inst. 8
o'clock P. M. states—"That a report had
reached there from New-London, advising,
that the British have landed a force at the east
end of Long Island; and at Montauk Point,
had ordered the inhabitants to fall back 10
miles."

tion on the distant readers of the Newspapers
(presuming the inhabitants of the city, except
the Baptists, are already convinced) do declare
Mr. Knowlan's readiness to appear at any time
without putting any obstacle in the way to con-
fute Mr. Reis's false allegations respecting him,
and to prove the several charges he (Mr.
Knowlan) has made in vindication of his own
character against Mr. Reis, and they are ready
to receive any communication from Mr. Reis
on the subject.—They further declare, if Mr.
Reis does not call on them, they will call on
him for the purpose; and in case of refusal,
that they will publicly call upon the Elders of
the Baptist church in this city to compel Mr.
Reis to a public investigation.
