Extract from the New-York Evening Post, of Aug. 27, 1814.

BALTIMORE, AUG. 25.—"The enemy have taken Washington. They entered it last evening without much opposition; they marched in a solid column, and appeared to take no notice of the fire of our militia. Winder is said to have retreated across the long bridge into Virginia. The enemy is said to be commanded by Lord Hill; but no certain accounts of his force. Some say 5000, some 7000, and others 13,000. My opinion it consists of 8 or 9000.

Extract of a letter from Baltimore, August 25, 1814.

"Our troops at Washington have been defeated. The Capitol blown up—the Navy-Yard burnt. The troops from Baltimore appear to be almost the only men that made any fight; they stood their ground one hour and a quarter, and suffered severely. The British force was nearly double ours. They say Lord Hill commands, this I doubt. William Pinkney, Esq. is wounded in the hand; S. Stewart, Esq. in the shoulder, and many others. Further particulars not known.

Our town is in great commotion; we may expect the enemy here in a short time in all probability. We are unprepared to meet them, having sent our best troops to Washington, and no reinforcements coming in from Philadelphia.

P. S. The latest accounts say, the capitol of Washington is still standing.

Another letter same date—Lord Hill has taken Washington. It is said he has 10,000 troops, and was only opposed by the 5th Regt. from here. There was also a brigade of 1700 in action, that did not fire a shot.

All the public buildings at Washington are burnt. Winder with the American force has retreated to Alexandria; the British following him.

Madison, Armstrong, and Munroe; were in the engagement at Bladenburgh; Pinckney is said to be wounded. Lord Hill has issued a proclamation, ordering all private property to be respected, and requested the inhabitants to inform him of all abuses.

The following was received this morning by the Editors of the New-York Gazette from their correspondent.

Office of the Baltimore Gaz. Thursday Evening Aug. 15.

That the Capital of the U. S. is in possession of the enemy, is a fact that can no longer be doubted—What the force of the enemy is we have not been able to ascertain. The report of some of the Volunteers of this City, who have just returned from the scene of action at Bladenburgh, state it about 9000. It certainly must have been larger than was expected, as it would appear that after an ineffectual opposition, chiefly by our brave volunteers from this city & Bladenburgh; they were permitted to take quiet possession of the seat of government.

We have not been able to obtain such a detail of the recent transactions at or near Washington, as to offer to the public. We have understood generally that the Capital and the Navy-Yard have been destroyed—and it is said a proclamation had been issued by Lord Hill to assure the citizens that private property shall be respected.

Attack on Stonington.

The following are some of the particulars of the late attack upon Stonington:—On the 9th July a British frigate, a sloop of war, and a gun brig, anchored at Stonington harbor, when a flag was sent on shore to acquaint the inhabitants that in consequence of some torpedo equipments from Stonington, they had orders to destroy the town; and that an hour would be allowed to remove the women and children. Soon after Capt. Palmer, and others went off with a flag, and Capt. P. asked the flag officer "if it would be satisfactory if they delivered up all the public property." The answer was, "You know, Sir, I am a British officer, and I have no right to expostulate. Our orders are to destroy the town;" and repeated that one hour would be allowed for the removal of the women and children. Capt. P. observed he hoped the hour would be a long one. About five hours after they commenced firing rockets, and balls, and continued them until midnight; then ceased and renewed the firing at sunrise, until 11 o'clock. A few houses were very much injured; and three or four persons slightly wounded by the rockets; the fire from which was very easily extinguished by persons who stood ready with buckets of water. The citizens had two long 18 pounders in a small battery, with which they drove the gun-brig from her moorings, sunk a barge, and did other damage. They exhibited great spirit; and were speedily reinforced by several corps of the militia.

On Thursday the bombardment was recommenced; but no great additional injury was done. Upwards of 2000 militia were in Stonington. There were no troops on board; and the reinforcement which had arrived in the Sound consisted of three frigates only, under Com. Hotham.
