LONDON, AUGUST 14.

Government received dispatches
from Lord Gambier on Saturday.
We understand that the first meeting
between the English and American
Commissioners at Ghent was held on
Monday last, when their respective
credentials were exhibited. A se-
cond meeting is said to have taken
place on Wednesday, when some dis-
cussion ensued between the Plenipo-
tentiaries on the interests of their re-
spective Governments, but of two ge-
neral a nature to admit any certain
conclusions to be drawn from it. It
is rumoured, however, that the Re-
publican Commissioners were ex-
tremely reserved, and slow in the dis-
closure of their pretensions.

AUGUST 17.

A gentleman of the highest respec-
tibility, who has just completed a
tour of Ireland, declares that he ne-
ver was in a country more tranquil
than Ireland is at this moment, or in
which he experienced more liberali-
ty and kindness.

The standard of copper has fallen
during the last three months, 34.
per ton; a reduction which has been
severely felt in all the Cornwall mines,
particularly the deep ones.

The honors which are continued to
be conferred on the Hereditary Prince
of Orange, encourage the hope that a
lately projected matrimonial union,
so highly desirable in every point of
view, may yet be accomplished. His
Royal Highness was last night Gazet-
ted as an Extra Knight of the Order
of the Bath.

The Duke of Cumberland is short-
ly to lead to the hymeneal altar the
Widowed Princess of Salms. The
approbation of the Prince Regent in
Council, was formally obtained on
Monday last.

Lord Castlereagh has taken with
him his full robes of the Order of the
Garter, in which he will appear when
he invests the Emperor of Austria and
the Prince Sovereign of the Nether-
lands with that Order. His Lordship
takes with him also the full robes of
the Order for those Sovereigns.

AUGUST 24.

The preparations for the expedition
to America still go forward with ac-
tivity, as respects the military part of it,
but the flat-bottomed boats which
were put on ship board, last week,
were on Monday re-landed. A strong
party of the Staff Corps, and a detach-
ment of the Royal Sappers and Mi-
ners, are at Cumberland Fort, in rea-
diness to embark. Strong detach-
ments of the following regiments em-
barked last week:—1st, 9th, 39th,
44th, 49th, 58th, 81st, 89th, and 103d.
Detachments of the following corps
will also embark:—1st, or Royal
Scots, 3d, 6th, 21st, 29th, 37th, 41st,
57th, 62d, 70th, 76th, 82d, 85th,
98th, 99th, and 100th, the whole a-
mounting to about 2100 men, in the
best order and equipment.

Some of the transports collected at
Poussmouth are destined to Madeira,
to receive the British troops who gar-
rison that Island, and take them out to
America. The remainder will pro-
ceed to Cork, and take on board the
troops collected there, where, also, the
whole will rendezvous, and sail to-
gether, under the **Valiant**, and other
men of war. Lord HILL will take
his passage in one of the line of battle
ships.

ST. JOHN, NEW-BRUNSWICK,
MONDAY, OCTOBER 24, 1814.

Arrived Saturday, H. M. Brig **Recruit**,
Capt. Sykes, from Halifax—Sailed again this
morning, for Moole Island.

We were this morning favored with a
Montreal Herald of the 8th inst. via Frederic-
ton—Nothing new whatever from thence.

Yesterday morning Boston Papers
were in town to the 14th—we did
not see them, as the persons who had
them were on their route to Halifax.
From a Gentleman who had the pe-
riusal of them, we learn, that the fol-
lowing is a summary of their con-
tents:

"That the Americans lost at Fort
Erie, in killed, wounded and prison-
ers, 45 officers and 446 men. They
say the number of Prisoners taken
from the British were 382, including
12 officers.

"The accounts from New-York
to Oct. 10, say—Gen. Izard was
with his army, at Buffaloe, (date not
mentioned)—Com. Chauncey was
off Kingston, blockading Sir James
Yeo.

"Five boats belonging to the Brit-
ish N. W. Company, had been taken
by a Lieutenant Dickson; valued at
12,000 dollars.

"Sir James Yeo's ship, the **St. Law-
rence**, was ready for sailing—our ac-
count says, she cannot get over King-
ston Bar with her guns on board, and
will not venture out without them.
Another account, (from the New-
York Gazette) says, "we have seen
letters from Com. Chauncey, dated
off Kingston, 1st Oct. stating the **St.
Lawrence** was nearly ready to sail,
and concludes, that on her coming
out he would be obliged to take shel-
ter in Sackett's Harbor." From this
circumstance it would appear that Sir
James would manage to get out with
his guns on-board.

"The **John Adams**, (arrived at
Boston from Ghent,) left in with on
1st. Sept. off the **Lizard**, a fleet of
transports with troops on board,
bound from Portsmouth for Cork,
supposed to be the expedition under
Lord HILL, destined for America.

"Private letters from Ghent, receiv-
ed by the **John Adams**, mentions
there is no prospect of a peace being
concluded upon with the present ne-
gotiators from America."

Since writing the above, and just
as our paper was putting to Press, we
were favored by the Editor of the
Courier, with a Handbill received
via Moose Island, stating, that the
British had been defeated in an attack
on Mobile. A memorandum which
accompanied the above, says: "In the
attack upon Mobile, the Amphion
frigate was blown up by a red hot shot
passing through the Magazine, and
the **Bonne Citoyenne** sloop of war
was sunk."

MONTREAL, OCTOBER 8.

We are without any intelligence
from the Niagara district, that can be
depended upon. The enemy has
made no movements on the frontiers
of this Province since our last num-
ber was published.

Intelligence is received from Mac-
kinac, via Matchedache and York,
stating that the enemy had left two
armed schooners to blockade the
place, until the winter should set in,
and then retire. Col. McDouall it is
said conceived and executed the plan
of capturing them. This was done
in the night by a combined attack of
Soldiers and Indians, in Canoes and
Boats. [This news is since con-
firmed.]—Gaz.
