BY his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, Regent of the United Kingdom of Great-Britain and Ireland in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty.

A PROCLAMATION.
Declaring the CESSATION OF ARMS, as well by Sea as Land, agreed upon between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, and enjoining the observance thereof.

GEORGE P. R.

WHEREAS a Convention for the Suspension of Hostilities between His Majesty and the Kingdom of France, was signed at Paris on the Twenty-third Day of April last, by the Plenipotentiary of His Majesty and the Plenipotentiary of His Royal Highness Monsieur, Brother of the Most Christian King, Lieutenant-General of the Kingdom of France: And whereas for the putting an End to the Calamities of War, as soon and as far as may be possible; It hath been agreed between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty, as follows; that is to say, That as soon as the Convention shall be signed and ratified, Friendship should be established between His Majesty and the Kingdom of France by Sea and Land in all Parts of the World: And in order to prevent all Causes of Complaint and Dispute which might arise with respect to Prizes that might be made at Sea after the Signature of the said Convention; It has also been reciprocally agreed, That the Vessels and Effects which might be taken in the English Channel and in the North Seas, after the Space of Twelve Days, to be reckoned from the Exchange of the Ratifications of the said Convention, should be restored on both Sides; That the Term should be One Month within the British Channel and North Seas to the Canary Islands and to the Equator, and Five Months in every other Part of the World, without any Exception or other particular Distinction of Time or of Place: And whereas the Ratifications of the said Convention were exchanged by the respective Plenipotentiaries above mentioned on the Third Day of this instant May, from which Day the several Terms above mentioned, of Twelve Days, of One Month, and Five Months, are to be computed: Now, in order that the several Epochs fixed as aforesaid between His Majesty and His Most Christian Majesty should be generally known and observed, We have thought fit, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the Advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to notify the same to His Majesty's loving Subjects; And We do hereby, in the Name and on the Behalf of His Majesty, strictly charge and command all His Majesty's Officers, both at Sea and Land, and all other His Majesty's Subjects whatsoever, that they forbear all Acts of Hostility, either by Sea or Land, against the Kingdom of France, Her Allies, Her Vassals, or Subjects, under the Penalty of incurring His Majesty's highest Displeasure.

Given at the Court at Carlton House, the Sixth Day of May, in the Fifty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, and in the Year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fourteen.

Arrived, H. M. Ship Martin, Captain Senhouse, from Halifax.

From HALIFAX, AUGUST 1.

Arrived, Monday afternoon, Ship Wolfe's Cove, Stephenfon, Portsmouth, 49 days

Tuesday, Brig William, Fullerton, Guadaloupe 15 days;

Brig Tyger, from Malaga bound to a Prussian Port—had been captured by the Yankee Privateer, and was re-captured by H. M. S. Bulwark;

Schooner Fancy, Garrison, St. Andrews, 10 days; and,

Am. Letter of Marque, Brig Henry Guild-er, from New-York bound to Bordeaux—prize to the Niemen.

Also arrived Wednesday, Sloop Diana, from New-York bound to the Havannah—prize to the Acadia.

Thursday, brig Elizabeth, 17 days from Quebec. The Diomed and Indian, with three transports sailed for this place the 10th ult. On Friday the 22d, saw a 50 gun-ship, and several other vessels, supposed Diomed &c. at anchor in Gut of Canso.

Thursday evening, H. M. S. Martin, Capt. Senhouse, and three Transports, with American prisoners from Moose Island—Passenger in the Martin, Colonel Pilkington, &c. &c.

Saturday, His Majesty's Ship Dragon, Capt. Barry, from the Chesapeake, 11 days.—Passengers, Captain Ross, R. N. and John Dougan, Esq.

His Majesty's Brig l'Espoir, Captain Duff, from Bermuda, 7 days.—Passenger, Colonel Douglas, 98th Regt.—His Majesty's Ships Pelorus and Primrose arrived at Bermuda the 22d ult. from Bourdeaux, which place they left the 2d June, in company with a fleet of Transports, having on board the 4th, 44th, and 85th Regiments; three Companies of Artillery, and one of Artillery Drivers, under the command of Gen. Ross—parted from them on the 26th June. Sir ALEX. COCHRANE, was still at Bermuda but would leave the Island immediately after the arrival of the above Troops from Bourdeaux, for some part of the American Coast. Another Regiment was expected at Bermuda from Gibraltar.

Yesterday, His Majesty's Ship Erne, the Hon. Capt. Napier, from Bourdeaux, 42 days—sailed from the Garonne, the 16th June, in company with His Majesty's Ships York and Vengeur, and 43 sail of Transports, bound to Quebec, having on board between 6 and 7000 troops, under the command of General Kempf—parted from them on Sunday the 24th ult. at the entrance of the St Lawrence. At the time of the Erne's departure from Bourdeaux, Lord Hill was momentarily expected here to embark for Canada, where, it was generally understood, he is to command the Troops. On the Banks of Newfoundland, the Erne chased, unsuccessfully, an American privateer brig.

Also, arrived yesterday, the Am. sch. Eric, and sloops Robust, Morning Star and Eclipse, prizes to the Dragon.

DIED] At his house in Mauderville, in the County of Sunbury, on Saturday the 9th ult. John Mercereau, Esquire, a worthy and respectable Magistrate of that County, in the 93d year of his Age.—His remains were in-

terred on Monday following, most respectfully attended by his numerous friends. Mr. Mercereau had been a very active and spirited loyalist during the late American war, and remained an uncommonly active man for his years until very shortly prior to his decease—he was an upright Magistrate—a very honest and industrious man, and highly esteemed throughout the County of Sunbury.
