LONDON, MAY 7.

An expedition is intended to be
embarked from Cadiz for the Missis-
sippi, to consist of 12,000 Spanish
troops, for the purpose of being em-
ployed in the recovery of Louisiana &c.
The head quarters of Sir T. Gra-
ham's army consisting of the Guards,
the 83d and 54th Regiments, were to
be at Brussels the 5th inst. The 83d
and 54th will be made 1000 strong
each, and sent to America. They
will sail finally from Cork.

The number of foreign troops in-
tended to be detained in France, pro
tempore, is seventy-five thousand,
consisting of equal proportions of
Russians, Austrians, and Prussians:
the whole to remain in the pay of
Great Britain.

The 97th (or Queen's German
Regiment) is ordered from Kinfales, to
embark for North America.

MAY 8.

The Duke of Wellington arrived
at Paris on Wednesday last, and in
the evening was present at a grand ball
given by Sir Charles Stewart. No-
thing could exceed the enthusiasm
with which his Grace was received.
The Emperors of Russia and Austria,
and Kings of Prussia and France, were
present, and about 700 persons of the
first distinction. Every one else,
however, seemed to be an object of
inferior curiosity.—The dancing ceas-
ed as if by common consent when
his Grace entered. An old company
squeezed after him into every room.
Marshal Blucher and Platow laid hold
of his arms, and walked with him for
two hours. They and every other
General besides exclaimed, "Here
is the First Captain of the Age."
"Here is the man that set the whole
machine in motion!" All the
French Marshals pined about him
with marks of the highest admiration
and respect. "What a triumph for the
Duke!—What a tribute to Great-
Britain!"

MAY 12.

At the late peace the reduction
went down to 60 regiments; we un-
derstand it is intended at present to
retain 80 regiments, as our possessions
abroad now require a larger scale of
defence than formerly.

Lieut. Col. Campbell, who accom-
panied Bonaparte from Paris, is pro-
moted to the Brevet rank of Colonel
in the army, "on the continent of
Europe and in the island of Elba only."
From this expression, it would
appear, that Col. Campbell, and the
other allied Officers, placed in super-
intendance over Napoleon, are to
continue with him in Elba for some
time.

The Liberty, Captain Bucking-
ham, arrived at Torbay, on Monday,
from Bayonne. She sailed the 1st
instant, at which time it was report-
ed that Sir John Hope was doing
well, and nearly recovered of his
wounds.

The loss of the French in the battle
of Bayonne was in proportion of 3
to 1 of the allies.

ROYAL DECREE.

From the Moniteur of the 8th of May.
Louis, by the Grace of God, &c.

The Senate and Legislative Body
are convoked for the 31st of May, in-
stead of the 10th of June, as stated in
our Declaration of the 2d instant.

Given at the Thuilleries, 6th May,
1814.

By an arrival at Falmouth we are
happy to learn that Sir John Hope is
much recovered of his wounds, and
has been restored to liberty.

The Court Martial held at Port-
smouth on Admiral Stirling, late Com-

mander in Chief at Jamaica, on char-
ges, we understand, of irregularity in
granting convoys to the merchant
shipping at that Island, has termina-
ted; and that Officer is prevented e-
ver again being employed by the fol-
lowing sentence:—

"The charge against Vice Admi-
ral Stirling is in part proved, and
he is sentenced for ever to be remo-
ved from the half-pay list, nor ever
to be included in any further pro-
motion of Flag Officers."

PORTSMOUTH, MAY 7.

Commodore Codrington is expect-
ed to hoist his broad pendant on
Tuesday next, in the New-castle, 50,
Lord George Stuart, and to sail im-
mediately afterward for the American
station; taking with him all the ships
that are ready for sea at this Port, ex-
cepting such as have been appointed
for the protection of Convoys: they
have been preparatively directed to
put themselves under his orders.
And, yesterday, that fine and well ap-
pointed Regiment, the 1st, or Royal
Scots, 1000 strong, embarked on
board the Leopard, Capt. Crofton,
and Diomedé, Capt. Fabian, for
North America. The Dictator, Dia-
tem, Thames, and Weser, armed en
flute, with 70 sail of large transports,
have sailed this week for Bordeaux,
to take a part of Lord Wellington's
army to the American shores. These
overpowering reinforcements to the
army already in Canada, will soon
effect the subjugation of Mr. Madri-
son's wildtheoretic notions of legisla-
tion.

The French fleet at Toulon hoist-
ed the white flag, and fired a salute
of 91 guns, accompanied with other
manifestations of loyalty to Louis
XVIII on the 20th ult. The same
was done by all the forts in the arse-
nal.

Bristol is the first outpost that has
availed itself of permission to trade to
the East-Indies, for which destination
two fine vessels sailed last week.

An order has been received to dis-
charge all Foreign seamen out of the
British service.

The following are some of the ships
which are expected to sail on Wed-
nesday next, for the American sta-
tion: New-castle, Commodore Cod-
rington, Lord George Stuart; Leo-
pard, Captain Crofton; Diomedé,
Capt. Fabian; Hermes, 20, Hon.
Capt. Percy; Erebus (Rocket sloop),
Captain Bartholemew; Devastation
(Bomb) Capt. Alexander; Meteor
(Bomb) Capt. S. Roberts; Adder,
Capt. Paterhall; and Pelter, Capt.
Haye.

The Vengour, 74, has taken out
her lower deck guns, for the purpose
of taking prisoners to Bordeaux;
and, it is supposed, troops from
thence to America.

Dispatches were on Sunday re-
ceived by Government, announcing
the arrival of Bonaparte at the Island
of Elba. He embarked on board the
Undaunted frigate to be conveyed to
that place. Throughout the whole
of the South of France wherever he
passed, he was hoisted by the popu-
lace, and in some places stored.
Sometimes he was obliged to mix
with his attendants, in order to screen
himself from the fury of the people,
and to join in the cry of "Vivent les
Bourbons;" at other times, to mount
the white-cockade, and in short, his
whole journey was one of peril, and
had in several places nearly been fa-
tal to him.—On his journey he would
not speak to any body but Colonel
Campbell. He expressed the utmost
contempt of all nations but Great-
Britain, of which he uttered the war-
