

Society Islands, and the coasts of New Zealand and Japan, together with other ports and islands frequented by our whale ships, for the purpose of giving them countenance and protection, should they be required. Other smaller vessels have been, and still are, employed in prosecuting the surveys of the coast of the United States, directed by various acts of Congress; and those which have been completed will shortly be laid before you.

The suppression of the African slave trade has received the continued attention of the Government. The brig Dolphin and schooner Grampus have been employed during the last season on the coast of Africa, for the purpose of preventing such portions of that trade as was said to be prosecuted under the American flag. After cruising off those parts of the coast most usually resorted to by slavers, until the commencement of the rainy season, these vessels returned to the United States for supplies, and have since been despatched on a similar service. From the reports of the commanding officers, it appears that the trade is principally carried on under Portuguese colors; and they express the opinion that the apprehension of their presence on the slave coast has, in a great degree, arrested the prostitution of the American flag to this inhuman purpose.

It is hoped that, by continuing to maintain this force in that quarter, and by the exertions of the officers in command, much will be done to put a stop to whatever portion of this traffic may have been carried on under the American flag, and to prevent its use in a trade, which, while it violates the laws, is equally an outrage on the rights of others and the feelings of humanity. The efforts of the several governments who are anxiously seeking to suppress this traffic must, however, be directed against the facilities afforded by what are now recognized as legitimate commercial pursuits, before that object can be fully accomplished.

On our first page is an article with reference to the Boundary question, copied from the Augusta Age, which is rather more explicit with reference to the designs of the State of Maine than is customary, and we hope it will be met by vigilance and promptitude on the part of Her Majesty's government. The covert manner in which it is intended to establish a claim is now beyond dispute. Let us get possession of the country says Mr. Blake, and by introducing American institutions, and an American population, "build up the same evidences of title to the country, as now exist between the Penobscot and St. Croix—beautiful villages and populous towns."

Now this was precisely the course pursued by the State of Massachusetts; and one of the reasons why the Seoudie was allowed to be the St. Croix, from which to run the treaty line was, that grants had been made out by that State, and it would be creating much confusion and loss to individuals, if they were disturbed; and hence all the country between the Penobscot and Seoudie, and perhaps extending as far as the Kennebec,—for there can be little doubt, but that was the original St. Croix, was improperly yielded to the United States.

But we trust the period for concession has gone by; and that not only will the American settlers be compelled to withdraw from the Aroostook; but that the line of demarcation will at once be asserted by the Queen's government; and the people of the State of Maine, be told—"Thus far shalt thou go and no farther."

Since writing the above we have received the President's message, and have selected a short article from the New York Albany upon the subject. We perfectly agree with its editor, that if the question is left to the action of the General Government and the arbitration of a friendly Power, there exists no ground for a hostile collision between the two countries; but if the State of Maine persists in its evident determination to intrude and get possession of the disputed territory, without the consent of Great Britain; then there must be war, at least on the borders.

The Post Office Commission which is now sitting at Montreal, seems determined to make the most diligent inquiries, and have transmitted circulars, which embrace a vast variety of statistical and other information; the replies to which, will place government in possession of a fund of knowledge, of which they previously could have had no conception. The effects of education and the general diffusion of intelligence, will also be perceived from the number of publications in the different colonies, the extent of their circulation; and we may add, the support which they receive. We have transmitted a statement from this office, in reply to queries that were forwarded a few weeks since; and although our general circulation probably equals, if it does not exceed, that of any other Journal in the Province; yet we apprehend we shall cut but a poor figure in comparison with Upper and Lower Canada, and the neighboring Province of Nova Scotia; where one paper alone, *The Nova Scotian*, has a circulation of upwards of 2000 copies.
