

# FROM THE ST. ANDREW'S HERALD.

Jan. 5.

On the evening of the New Year, the Scotch Church was opened for the reception of visitors. The front was brilliantly illuminated by wax lights, tastefully arranged, and had a fine effect. Several appropriate pieces of Sacred Music were executed, and a great number of most respectable inhabitants of both sexes were present. On this occasion we think the following description may not be uninteresting.

The outside of the Church is finished in the Doric Order; and the extreme height of the Steeple is one hundred and twenty feet. The inside is executed in the Ionic Order. The Gallery is supported by ten Ionic columns of the most beautiful Bird eye Maple. The Pedestal of the Gallery is composed of the finest Mahogany inlaid with panels of Bird eye Maple. The pulpit & Precentor's Box, are of Mahogany, supported by six columns of the same, in the Doric and Ionic Orders. In the rear of the Pulpit is a Venetian Window with four Mahogany columns in the Ionic Order. The ceiling finished in ornamental stucco work, forming a large and handsome panel, supported by an Elliptic Arch. The whole has been planned by, and executed under the immediate and constant superintendence of Mr. JOSEPH STEVENSON, and every part bears the most ample evidence of his skill, fidelity, and attention; it is one of the most neat, elegant, and substantial places of Public Worship, throughout British America. The Church and Manse will cost about 16,000 dollars; and by this the public may form some idea of the magnitude of the benefaction of C. SCOTT, Esq. who has thus generously made the most acceptable present to the disciples of the Church of Scotland, and their descendants, which man can offer; and for which his name will be held in grateful remembrance long after the edifices themselves shall have yielded to the relentless scythe of time.

## CONSCIENTIOUS QUAKERS.

On Friday week, two females belonging to the Society of Friends, were brought to Bow-street office upon a charge of distributing bills at the pit door of Drury-lane Theatre, the object of which was to prevent persons from visiting that or any other theatre, as being places of a profane and improper nature. On being asked what motive induced them to circulate such bills, the elder of the two, apparently about fifty years of age, answered that she was called upon to do so by the irresistible power of Divine Inspiration. She occasionally gave utterance to the Spirit at the Meeting-house, near Exeter-street; and in pursuance of the Divine influence, she felt herself bound to announce to sinners the ways of God, and to warn them from the indulgence of those sinful pleasures which are always the attendants of the temples of the Archfiend. They were each fined in the penalty of £20 for distributing bills without the printer's name being attached to them, with the understanding that the penalty would not be enforced if they desisted from further pursuing their mission.
