

ADDRESS

PRESENTED BY THE COUNTY OF YORK

To His Excellency Sir Charles Metcalfe, Baronet, &c.

We, the Loyal People of the County of York, including the Magistrates, Merchants, Traders, Freedholders, and other Inhabitants of Frederickton, the Metropolis of this Province, cannot refrain from coming forward to express our sentiments on the great Constitutional struggle in which Your Excellency has recently been engaged with your late confidential advisers, and to record our admiration of the noble stand Your Excellency has taken in maintaining the undoubted Prerogatives of the Crown, which we conceive have been invaded by the extraordinary claims for the exercise of Patronage, which those Gentlemen appear to have put forth.

We have witnessed with great interest the proceedings of the Representatives of the People of New Brunswick, now assembled in Provincial Parliament, on this momentous question, and we cordially respond to the loyal and patriotic sentiments embodied in their Address to Your Excellency of the twenty-second February instant, feeling, as we do, to use their own emphatic language, that such a surrender of the Royal Prerogative as that sought for, would soon lead to the destruction of Monarchical Institutions on this Continent.

It affords us the most inexpressible satisfaction, as Descendants of the Loyalists of 1783, who founded the Settlement of this flourishing County, to have an opportunity of giving utterance to sentiments worthy of the patriotism and love of Country by which our Forefathers were actuated, and such of us as have made this land of our adoption from the Mother Country since that period, Your Excellency may be assured are animated with the same zeal to uphold the Crown against any invasion of its rights, and will be ever found ready to defend all those Institutions with which we have been blessed.

Looking back to the time when the ancestors of many of you sacrificed almost every other earthly good, in order to preserve inviolate their allegiance to the British Crown and their connection with their Father Land, every lover of his Country must be filled with admiration at such a splendid instance of loyalty and devotion; and it affords a proud enjoyment to see their Sons and their Sons' Sons eagerly embracing an opportunity to manifest the same noble spirit, with a view to uphold Constitutional Government, and to maintain affectionate union with the mighty Empire, of which British North America is a cherished portion. No less do I appreciate the hearty co-operation in the same cause of those who, born in the Mother Country, retain, across the broad Atlantic, their undiminished love for their former home, supporting the honor of the Crown and the integrity of Her Majesty's Dominions, and transmitting the same generous attachment as an inheritance to their posterity.

As long as these filial feelings pervade the people of these Provinces, British North America may confidently expect to flourish, prosperous, happy and free; secured against danger by the energy and courage of her own Children, and by the whole power of the British Empire, while the industry and enterprise of her inhabitants are adding daily to her wealth and resources, and to the enjoyment of nearly all the blessings that any Country in the World can give.
