During the contention which has been carried on in this Province for place, power and patronage, and in which the whole country has suffered so much, Quebec has been stripped of every thing connected with the Government. The General Post Office was the last of the public departments to be removed, and we see it is to be established in St. James' street Montreal.

The legislative buildings, erected or purchased out of the Provincial funds, have been completely gutted of their furniture and every thing portable, to decorate St. Ann's Market House, at Montreal, during the three years' lease. We are happy, however, to find that the Scientific and Literary Societies of Quebec have been allowed to replenish the building in part. The Quebec Library, by the exertions of the Commercial Library Association, has been transferred to the House of Assembly, and a reading-room established there; and for the specification of the "collective wisdom" of the Province, we shall occasionally have public lectures.

Quebec has had very little share in producing the dissensions which afflicted the Province, and from the effects of which this city has suffered so much. There are, however, some things of which we cannot be deprived; the general good, peaceable and loyal conduct of its inhabitants, its local position on the great channel of commercial communications of Canada; and, it is to be hoped, the increasing exertions, honest industry, and intelligence of its inhabitants.—Quebec Gazette.
