

# LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

(Thursday's debates concluded.)

The house went into a Committee of the whole in the consideration of the old Jail in the City and County of St. John. Hon. Col. Stone in the Chair.

Hon. Mr. KINNEAR said the old Jail was a large wooden building, and there was a great risk in letting it remain where it was; the magistrates were afraid of its taking fire and destroying the new Jail and Court House, and wished to have it pulled down or removed, but there was no Act to authorize them to do it.

Hon. Mr. STREET was surprised when he first heard there was such a Bill before the house; he thought the Justices of the Peace had a right to remove the Jail if they thought proper, without any further enactment.

Hon. Mr. KINNEAR said there was no Law to authorize them to remove it, and they did not wish to risk the responsibility, he thought there would be no harm to pass the Bill at any rate.

On motion of the hon. Mr. Kinnear the Chairman left the Chair and reported the Bill as agreed to.

The house went into a Committee of the whole in the consideration of a Bill to amend an Act to prevent nuisances in the City of St. John.

Hon. Mr. KINNEAR said the Bill had been drawn up grounded on a petition. At York Point there were a great number of houses built on a very small piece of land, some of them containing four or five families; some mornings the nuisances about some of these places are almost beyond description, and the great difficulty is you do not know on whom to fix it; some say the Grand Jury should indict the Landlord; but some of the buildings are let by three or four different parties, by one letting a house to another, and then this man to another, and so on for four or five different times. The Common Council cannot go into private property; by passing the Bill it will be the means of compelling the owners to put the houses in a proper state and have proper out houses. Another thing—it is desirable to compel owners of vacant lots to put up fences to prevent injury to passengers passing and repassing, and keep the fence in repair, providing the lot is a very dangerous one.

Hon. Mr. STREET asked if it was the intention of the hon. mover of the Bill to punish by a fine and imprisonment both, as that would be the construction that would be put on the Bill in its present shape. He (the hon. Mr. Street) thought it should be either a fine or imprisonment and not both.

Hon. Mr. KINNEAR said it was not the intention to impose a fine and imprisonment both, but to leave it to the discretion of the Court to do which it thought proper.

Hon. Mr. KINNEAR moved that the Chairman leave the Chair and report the Bill as agreed to.

Hon. Mr. JOHNSTON by leave presented a petition from John Owens, President, Robert D. Wilmot and Robert Robertson, Vice Presidents of the Provincial Association, and about two thousands other inhabitants of the Counties of St. John, King's, and York, praying for Legislative protection on Domestic Manufactures.

Moved that the petition be received and lie on the table.

House adjourned till to-morrow 12 o'clock.

## Friday, February 30.

The President took the Chair at the usual hour, and all the members were present.

Hon. Mr. BORSFORD said it seemed to devolve upon him to open the debate, having first called the attention of the House to the subject. He had proposed that the house should go into a committee of the whole on the Message of the Lieut. Governor containing the despatches of the Colonial Secretary, relating to the recent important changes made in this House, because it would give every member greater facility of expressing his views. He had hoped that some hon. member of the Government would have been prepared to have given this house some further information on this important subject; he thought it was, in courtesy due to this House, that the Executive should have laid before it at an early day the determination of her Majesty's Government, with respect to the reconstruction of the Legislative Council, and the facts upon which such changes were based. If such had been done, it would have relieved him (Mr. B.) from much doubt and difficulty in opening this debate. He did not wish, nor did he intend to question the exercise of the prerogative of the Crown, in selecting gentlemen to fill vacant seats in this House, he wished to be well understood on this point, and in the remarks, he should feel bound to make on the extraordinary manner in which the change had been made in the constitution of this House, he did not intend that they should apply to the hon. gentlemen who had been recently appointed; he hoped to receive their assistance also in obtaining the object he had at heart—the re-constituting this House from its present anomalous and dependent position. But there was another feature in these proceedings and in which the prerogative had been exercised, to which he could not bow so submissively, that was, the dismissal of some of the most experienced and valuable members of this House upon the acknowledged suggestion of the popular branch, and that without any intimation being given, or reference being had to this House, when such important changes were introduced into the constitution of this House, surely it was not too much to expect that some opportunity should have been given to this House to express an opinion upon their expediency previous to their adoption. But how different stands the case! This reconstruction and improvement of the Legislative Council was decided upon, its members had been cashiered and the only information they had ever received upon the subject had been dragged from the Executive by address, and that information was certainly anything but flattering to their honors, who had hitherto considered themselves members of an independent branch of the Legislature. He thought it due to this House, when any of its members were removed, that the grounds of such removal should be previously laid before this House to enquire into. This power was in accordance with the constitution of the Legislature of united Canada, and there was no reason why this House should not possess the privilege. It was necessary to its independence and free action. In the recent changes several valuable members had been dismissed from the Council, and to this late hour no information had been given to this House, stating the reasons upon which their dismissal had been founded, and he at least expected that some hon. member of the Executive would have been prepared to make the necessary explanation to-day. He (Mr. B.) would be one of the last persons to question the right of the Crown to appoint the members of this House and to remove them, but at the same time he felt it to be a proper subject of humble remonstrance, when the members of this House were dismissed, without the least intimation of the reasons being communicated to it, before attending to the address of the house of Assembly, on which Lord Stanley appears at once to have decided without giving this House an opportunity of being heard. He would endeavor to correct a misapprehension that had arisen as to the reasons which had influenced that house in not sustaining the Bill passed last session by the popular Branch affecting the composition of the Legislative Council, it was not because this House did not approve of many of its provisions, that the Bill was rejected, but the Council was influenced solely by the principle that it was unconstitutional and a breach of the privileges of this House, for the house of Assembly to originate a bill directly affecting the rights and privileges of this House, in the same manner as the house of Assembly would undoubtedly consider it a breach of their privileges, should the Legislative Council attempt to originate a money Bill or a Bill to regulate their elections. He would freely admit the right of the house of Assembly to address her Majesty upon the composition of the Legislative Council or upon any other subject connected with the Institutions of the Colony, this right could not be denied,
