In company with him your correspondent drove out last Sunday afternoon to visit the school and assist in their anniversary concert in the evening. The concert was highly successful, all the parts being well rendered, many of the younger scholars showing considerable talent.

This Sunday School with the division is doing a good work in a community which was rather neglected in moral and spiritual matters previous to their organization, and the same is true of many districts in this part of the county where divisions and Sunday Schools have lately been organized. The hall when built will be a great boon to the Sunday School and division for they are both hampered in their work for want of a suitable building.
