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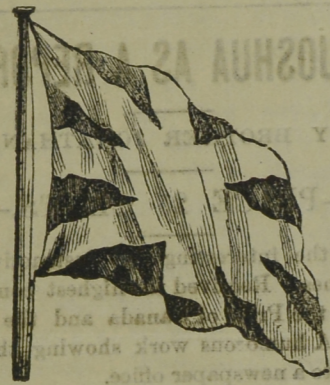

MR. EDITOR.—No doubt you will be pleased to learn of the onward march of our principles through many parts of our province. For the past six weeks I have labored in Queens, Victoria and Carleton

Counties, in the interests of Independent Order of Good Templars, and God has remarkably blessed my labours, and crowned my weak efforts with success. During that time I have organized 21 lodges, eight in Queens, one in York, four in Carleton and eight in Victoria, while arrangements have been made for more in a few days. The Country generally is ready for Temperance work, and there is now a general advance in every department of this holy field of labor. In Victoria Co especially is this work taking hold of the hearts and affections of the people, and causing many prayers and much work for God and humanity.

Where only a few weeks since was found only two lodges there is now ten; and they not working alone as individual societies but bound together in one strong and compact County Lodge.

**OUR ST. STEPHEN LETTER.**

At our last regular meeting the attendance was somewhat larger than we have had for some time.

After a full discussion of the matter it was decided to invest two hundred dollars in stock in the building to be erected by the W C T U.

Work has already begun on the cellar and the work is to be pushed forward as rapidly as possible. The building is to be of brick, the ground floor to be fitted up for Coffee and Reading rooms and the hall overhead to be arranged for Howard Division to meet in. It will cost between four and five thousand dollars, and the location is one of the best in town for the purpose for which it is intended.

It is under the control of a joint stock company composed entirely of temperance people, care being taken to sell only to those who were known to be in sympathy with the object for which the building is to be erected, the promotion of temperance in the community.

It is the desire of the W C T U in the near future, if God prospers them in their work, to become sole owners of the building, and we hope they may find the success which they anticipate.

They have shown considerable pluck and business ability in the management of the enterprise so far, for which they deserve great credit and especial praise is due Mrs. Dr. Todd and Mrs. J. D. Chipman, the soliciting committee, who so ably performed their duties disposing of all the stock in so short a time.

Taking advantage of the presence of Mayor Howland of Toronto in town we have arranged for a public temperance meeting in Chipman's hall tonight, at which he has kindly consented to deliver an address. We expect to greet him with a crowded house and I wish all the temperance workers in this vicinity could hear the man who has made for himself such an enviable reputation by the stand he has taken on the side of temperance and morality.

In company with Bro. Hugh Stevenson I had the pleasure of visiting Rising Sun division at Heathland last Tuesday night, and at the request of my brother Deputy of that division, of installing their officers for them. The work done by this division has made a marked change in the district, and the reformation of the man who has been exalted to to honorable position of W. P. for this quarter is in itself worth all the sacrifices th
