### CHEAPER CABLE RATES RESOLUTION

That Armstrong omnibus resolution covering everything from railway freight rates to cable, telegraph and telephone tolls and thence to the postal service, was another bone of contention in the commons today.

It will be remembered that this document standing on the order paper resulted in the animated and somewhat acrimonious controversy between Joseph E. Armstrong and William F. MacLean.

This afternoon Hon Mr. Lemieux sought to speak to a resolution calling for cheaper cable rates and counselling a system of imperial co-operation between the mother land and the overseas dominions. Mr. Speaker held him upon the ground that it was trespassing on Mr. Armstrong's preserves and a short discussion followed in which the premier, postmaster-general and ex-postmaster-general, participated. Mr. Lemieux finally consented to hold over his resolution till the member for East Lambton was present, on the understanding that it should be dealt with.

The house spent the rest of the day in supply.

## ROBINSON'S WEEKLY MARKET REPORT

St. John, Feb. 17—The stock market for the past month has been very irregular, working in the earlier part towards a decline and more lately showing an underlying strength and evidence of what is generally known as a creeping bull movement.

This movement has been led mainly by Union Pacific and United States Steel, while the Hill stocks have also been prominent and the Coppers have shown some evidence of strength.

On the whole, however, there has been very little change in the general level of prices. The transactions have been small and the tendency of the market has been rather towards dullness than activity: in fact, it has been purely and simply a trading market, influenced to a very large extent by the professional element.

The Chinese situation has had quite a serious effect on European politics and has had a tendency to promote rather than settle, differences of opinion which have arisen between the different governments.

### MONEY.

The money market is very quiet, in fact, almost dull with the exception of Canada.

In the United States, there is a large accumulation of idle money. England and Europe, which have recently been borrowers from the United States, are working into an easier position as illustrated by the reduction of rate by the Bank of England from four to three and a half per cent., and by the stronger statements which that institution has put out during the past fortnight.

In Canada money rates show no tendency to work easier. This, of course, is due to the tremendous development which is going on and to the fact that for many years to come Canada will be an extensive borrower in order to carry on the exportation of her vast natural resources.

### CANADA.

The Canadian Stock Market has shown quite a falling off, with the exception of Bank stocks; these have been strong on rumors of further mergers with which the names of the Union Bank and Quebec Bank have been largely associated.

The delay in the passing of the iron bounty has had a depressing effect on the stock of the Dominion Iron Corporation. The latest gossip in this regard is that the bounties are sure, notwithstanding the rumors of opposition and that large buying orders are in the market around 58. If there is any truth in this report we can expect a fairly steady market for this stock at from 59 to 60.

Detroit United has been very much in the limelight. It shows an excellent increase for January in spite of the cold weather, but is decidedly in an unfavorable position in regard to the city; the latest move of the part of the city being an attempt to compel the railroad to pay \$200 a day for the use of the Fort Street car line in addition to the \$300 which the company is now paying. In our opinion, matters are becoming so strained between the city and the railway company that there must be some settlement very soon.

Canadian Pacific continues to show a wonderful increase. The stock has been stronger during the last few days and the prospects of higher prices are considered very good.

Canada Cement Company is expected to show larger returns this year than last, when a considerable part of the earnings went into extensions of plant and operations.

On the whole, in spite of the temporary decline, the Canadian market is in a very good position and higher prices are more probable than any further decline.

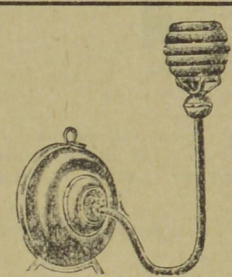
