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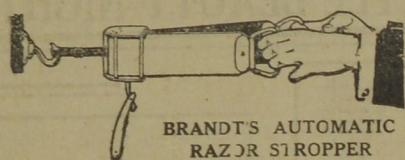
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**MILLTOWN CAME

Rugby team is back in Fredericton for a few days and incidentally is thinking out schemes for making the team of 1912 of timber at to make a bid for the Intercollegiate title. "Babe" is wondering how spring practice with a "course of sprouts" in the gymnasium would strike the members of the Red and Black Rugby squad. The coach realizes that a lack of proper connection between the forward and back divisions of the U. N. B. team of 1911 was what made that XV so ineffective. The Red and Black has not had a pair of quarters of the first fight since the days of Mike Rutledge, Billy McNaughton and Fred Baird and even those players good as they were did not measure up to

the standard set by "Stubby" Patterson and Joe McCarthy in 1902 and by McCarthy and Jack McBeath in the season following. "I think," remarked Coach Church yesterday, "that a pair of pretty fair quarter-backs can be developed by gymnasium work. They can be given an idea of what they will be expected to do and when September comes around will be in better shape than they would be without any such work." Spring practice and inter-class games in April and early May were held at U. N. B. some years ago to keep the Rugby men with the game in their minds and there seems to be no reason why the method should be allowed to fall into disrepute.
