NEWS FORCAST FOR THE COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Dec. 21—It is something almost without precedent for the national capital to pass a Christmas with no celebration at the White House, which always has been a great centre of attraction during the holidays. The President probably will have his Christmas celebration in Colon. It will be the first Christmas since he became President that Mr. Taft has not spent in the executive mansion, but with Mrs. Taft and several close friends, with him, he doubtless will enjoy the day almost as much as if he were in Washington.

In the homes of nearly all of the cabinet officials and other prominent in the affairs of the national government here the day will be essentially a family day. In the diplomatic corps the holiday will be observed according to the custom of each country represented. The "Noel" will be dully observed at the French embassy with all the customs of France, while roast pig, plum pudding and a burning vule log will aid the Christmas cheer of Merry England at the British embassy.

On the day after Christmas Admiral George Dewey, hero of the battle of Manila bay, and the ranking officer of the navy, will celebrate his seventy-fifth birthday anniversary, and he does not care who knows it. He is proud of the fact that he is seventy-five years old, for few men have reached his age retaining their good looks, the vigor of mental and physical youth, and last, but not least, the natural optimism of a schoolboy.

President-elect Woodrow Wilson will reach his fifty-sixth birthday anniversary Saturday. He promised to spend the day in Staunton, Va., the place of his birth. Plans are being made by citizens of Staunton to make his visit a notable occasion.

During the latter half of the week Boston will be the gathering place of hundreds of well known economists, historians, sociologists, statisticians and others interested in the promotion of various social sciences and reforms. Annual meetings will be held there by the American Economic Society, the American Historical Association, the American Political Science Association, the American Sociological Society, the American Statistical Association, the American Association for Labor Legislation and the Efficiency Society. It will be the most remarkable conjunction of such societies that has ever taken place in any city.

From Thursday until Saturday Washington will entertain the annual meetings of the Archaeological Institute of America, the American Philological Association and the Society of Biblical Literature. The Association of American Geographers will hold its annual session at New Haven and elsewhere there will be meetings of various other learned and educational societies. In numerous States the public school teachers will hold their State conventions during the holiday week, in accordance with their State conventions during the holiday week, in accordance with their annual custom.

CHICAGO'S GENEROUS SANTA CLAUSE

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 21—Showers of gold and loads of turkeys were distributed by a generous Santa Claus throughout Chicago's business district today. It is estimated that at least \$2,000,000 was distributed in bonuses among the employees of industries, banks and big stores, the probability that the total will be raised to \$13,000,000 by the addition of gifts deferred until Christmas Day or the end of the year. The biggest givers were the large factories and mercantile establishments that have adopted the profit-sharing plan. Practically all of the banks and brokerage houses presented their employees with gold pieces, from \$5 to \$20, in most cases according to rank and length of service.

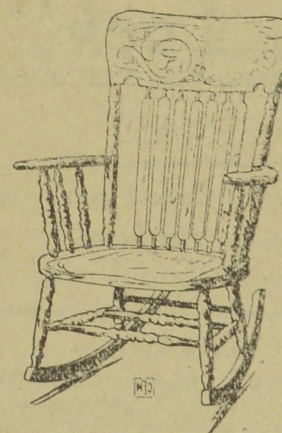
