## MINOR LEAGUES NOTIFIED

Cincinnati, O., Dec. 21—The National baseball commission issued an order here today instructing its secretary to notify every minor league club whose reservation list exceeds the legal number of names to revise it and make it accord with Section 4 of Article 7, of the national agreement. This section states that exclusive of the manager and ineligible players, a national association club may carry the following number reservation: Class A.A., 30; Class A., 28; Class B., 26; Class C., 24; Class D., 22.

The commission reports the Kansas City, Milwaukee, Dallas and Beaumont clubs have violated the section.
