# THE LATE LORD LISTER REVOLUTIONIZED SURGERY

London, Feb. 13.—Joseph Lister, first Baron Lister, who was made famous by his discovery of an anti-septic system of treatment in surgery, died yesterday. He was born in 1827, and had served as professor of surgery in Glasgow and Edinburgh universities and in King's College, London.

The great work Lord Lister accomplished, so unobtrusively, has revolutionized modern surgery and has been the means of saving the lives of thousands—one might almost say millions—of people for their is no surgeon in practice today who does not carry into effect with beneficent results the curative principles that Lord Lister deduced from his studies, researches and observations.

It was the discoveries of Pasteur into the origin of fermentation and putrefaction that led Lister into his far-reaching and important work on the cause and prevention of septic infection of wounds which brought about his own discovery of anti-septic treatment of wounds. The success of his treatment was immediate, definite and marked.

Patients carried from the field in battle and cut down by accident in the industrial field, whose cases would have been hopeless under the old surgery, were put swiftly on the road to recovery and the enlightened system of nursing which was an inseparable adjunct of the new treatment soon completed cures that half a century ago would have been regarded as impossible. The hospitals were transformed from hotbeds of septic poisoning, from which the most courageous often shrank in horror, into clean and wholesome institutions.

For his discoveries and scientific attainments Lord Lister received many honors. He was president of the British Association for the Advancement of Science in 1896, and of the Royal Society from 1895 to 1900 and he contributed many important papers to the medical and scientific journals.

The fact of his having for many years filled important surgical chairs in Edinburgh and Glasgow Universities led many to believe that the eminent surgeon was a Scotchman, but he did not owe his nativity to the northern kingdom, but was born at Upton, Essex, in 1827 and was thus in his 85th year. He graduated at University College, London, in 1852 and returned after his long service in Edinburgh to London to fill the chair of Clinical Surgery at King's College, from which he retired in 1893.

He was surgeon to the late Queen Victoria, who created him first a baronet and subsequently raised him to the peerage. He was afterwards sergeant-surgeon-in-ordinary to his late Majesty, King Edward.

Among his more important publications were a treatise on "The Effects

of the anti-septic treatment upon the salubrity of a surgical hospital," and "A contribution to the germ theory of the putrefaction and other fermentative changes."


