## HALIFAX CRESCENTS IN RUNNING FOR M.P.H.A. TITLE

Defeated New Glasgow 8 to 4 Last Night--Moncton Tripled Score on Halifax Socials

Halifax, Feb. 13--The Crescent hockey team by winning tonight's match have a chance for the championship after having been tail enders during the early part of the season.

## Chatham Trimmed 4 to 1 by Marysville in Fast Game

Both Teams Played Hockey from Start to Finish--But one Penalty Imposed and that near Close of Game--Score Stood 2 to 1 at Half Time--Crescents Made Victory Certain by Scoring Twice in Second Half--Chatham plays Fredericton Tonight

Marysville Crescents put a crimp in Chatham's championship aspirations at the Arctic Rink last night, trimming the North Shore aggregation 4 to 1 in the fastest and cleanest game of hockey seen here this winter. Fredericton will endeavor to repeat the trick tonight. The Crescents broke the goose-egg which has decorated their column of wins in the N. B. H. L. standing, and deserved to, as they played good hockey. Chatham as last year, has a fast team, but the forwards failed to handle the rubber as well as the Crescents did. The Chatham septette will probably win all games on Chatham ice, but on a modern rink their great advantage is not so apparent.

A small crowd saw the game, which was distinguished by having but one penalty, Carl Hovey of Marysville, being chased off for tripping Flood just before time was called. Bird was sick and Roy Robertson played instead, putting up a great game. The teams were evenly matched, but Marysville had it on the visitors to the degree shown by the score. The Marysville defence outclassed that of Chatham and their forwards, although out-skated, handled stick and puck in more effective style. In goal "Hib" Binney played as well as ever but when Crescents adopted the plan of running in on goal before shooting they beat him out. Len Inch also gave a good exhibition of goal-keeping. George Brogan was in the spotlight as usual and at cover-point. Fred Wade put up about the best game he has played this year. At centre ice Irvine Wade and Robertson were in the game at all stages, although up against Chatham's two best forwards in Synott and Carroll, the latter being particularly prominent. The Marysville wings had it on their opponents at all stages. At coverpoint Milford did not show up as well as had been expected. Watling got in many rushes but also gave Marysville's forwards chances of which they easily availed themselves.

### FIRST HALF

Crescents got away fast and kept play at the Chatham end for some time. Chatham relieved the pressure Carroll being prominent. Both teams were skating fast, Chatham probably being the better. Crescents were put on the defensive and after the puck had stayed around the Crescents end for some time Carroll scored.

skating and slashing were prominent. Wade got away after taking a pass but Referee Staples whistled for an off-side being pretty sharp. Brogan got in a long rush but lost the rubber to Watling. Fred Wade shot right afterward but Binney saved a score. Crescents got away on a rush but Dennison shot too far out instead of being in on goal. Both forward lines were playing sharply with neither having much on the other. Irvine Wade dodged through but Binney stopped in great style. Milford was hurt and there was a halt in the game. Crescents persisted in trying long shots. Brogan got away on a long rush. Synott lifted into the crowd and was hooted. Play livened up. Brogan and Robertson pulled off some good passing and "Nat" Hovey taking Robertson's pass scored.

Second half began with Chatham rushing matters. Crescents took it to the other end and I Wade missed a good chance to score. Right afterward "Nat" Hovey missing a chance of a life-time, his shot grazing the goal-post. Carroll and Synott were playing hard, Marysville was kept busy defending. The rubber went to the other end. Watling got away but shot wide. Dennison and Robertson took the disc to the Chatham end. Play went from end to end neither forward line being able to get through the opposing defence. Marysville finally got away on a rush and Carl Hovey scored on G. Hovey's pass.

Fred Wade got away and after the best dodging run of the game scored.

## AUSTRALIAN GAVE K.O. BROWN BATTLE OF HIS CAREER

Yankee Boxer Earned Decision after Getting Severe Punishment from Billy Galley at Philadelphia

Philadelphia, Feb. 12--Billy Galley of Australia gave "Knockout" Brown of New York a great battle at the American A. C. tonight, but Brown's greater strength, aggressiveness and harder punching earned for him the decision. The Australian, however, landed many a vicious punch, and at times worked a left jab; but he could not stop Brown from boring in and hammering away with right uppercuts.

Brown found Galley a ready wallower in the first round, the Australian giving about as good as he received, landing hard on the body and Brown on the face. Brown had the better of the second round. Galley, in warding off Brown's boring in, put his head down and was uppercut repeatedly. Galley tried a left jab and pushed to the face.

In the third round Galley continued to work his left jab successfully, and held Brown off pretty well, but "K. O." found time to land a couple of hard rights Brown's aggressiveness was rather too much for Galley in the fourth and fifth rounds. In one rush in the fourth Galley slipped to his knees but was up quickly and tore into Brown.

At the opening of the fifth round there was a lively exchange of swings to the face that warmed up the crowd but Galley could not keep pace with the ever-advancing Brown and was forced to break ground. In the sixth both boys were in hard, trying to make a grand windup. Galley got Brown on the ropes once and planted both hands hard, but again Brown's strength and ruggedness asserted itself. Galley was fought off and given a good walloping with the ever-ready right.
