STRONG LANGUAGE FROM B.C. SOCIALIST

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 12—Proclaiming the constitutional right of the people to tear down the Union Jack if they liked, J. W. Hawthornthwaite M.L.A., addressed a free speech meeting at the Grand Theatre last evening. The hall was packed to the roof, the crowd being so great that the doors were closed before 8 o'clock.

Hawthornthwaite in the course of his speech said: "The majority of the working people—the only useful people—decide that they don't want the old rag, they have the constitutional right to tear it down and make a mock of it—to wash some of the bloodstains out of it."

His remarks were greeted with loud cheers. Another little pleasantry voiced by Hawthornthwaite was that if the working men were to get their teeth in and hang on, as "Comrade" Pettipiece had suggested they had better not get their teeth into a Victoria "bull" or they would probably die of blood poisoning.

STEAMER IN COLLISION FORTY-TWO DROWNED

Nagasaki, Japan, Feb. 13—Forty-six members of the crew and passengers were drowned by the sinking after a collision of the Japanese steamer The Ryosa Maru and the Mori Maru today. The Ryosa Maru was a steamer of 81 tons net built in 1878 at Siga, Japan and owned by the Yossida Keikoku, while the Mori Maru was a steamer of 1,109 tons net built at West Hartpool in England in 1869 and owned by the Yossida Seiko.

SHEEP MEN DEPLORE DECLINE IN INDUSTRY

(Toronto Globe.)

How the consumer and the farmer could benefit at the same time by reciprocal trade arrangements with the United States, the question which was laughed at by the Conservatives in the recent reciprocity campaign, was illustrated yesterday afternoon at the final session of the Ontario Sheepbreeders' Association.

It was pointed out that during the past year thousands of sheep have been imported into Ontario from the United States in spite of the import tax, and many of the members were of the opinion that had this handicap been removed at the last federal election, they would have been able to get their stock sheep much cheaper, and consequently would have been able to let the consumer have them when fattened at a much lower price.

At the session of the Dominion Sheep-breeders' Association in the morning the decay of the sheep industry in Canada was deeply regretted by many of the members and the opinion was expressed that something should be done to revive it if possible. For this purpose, therefore, a committee consisting of Lieut.-Col. McCrae of Guelph, Col. McEwen of Byron and Mr. R. H. Harding of Thorndale, was appointed to go to Ottawa to confer with the minister of agriculture and the commissioner and report at the next meeting.

A FRIEND OF THE POOR SHE DIED A PAUPER

New York, Feb. 13—A life devoted to charity has ended with the death of a pauper in the city hospital on Blackwell's Island of Dr. Mary Baldwin. She was 76 years old, and as a physician for years she devoted all her practice to the poorest of the poor without charge. In later years, she became of the class she had long aided and broken with age and starvation she was found in a miserable little room in a Bowery House a few days ago, by a doctor whom she once aided. Her body was taken to the morgue last night, and placed among the unclaimed dead.
