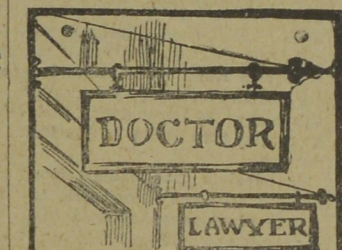

WINNIPEG TORY PAPER'S
ATTACK ON MR. LEONARD

(Toronto Globe)

The Winnipeg Telegram, the organ
 of the Hon. Robert Rogers aston-
 ished the people of the West last
 week by a vigorous attack on Major
 Leonard, who was appointed by the
 Borden government National Trans-
 portation Railway Commissioner and
 given the widest powers to rush the
 work of construction to completion.
 The Telegram like other Conserva-
 tive papers, praised Major Leonard
 warmly when he took the office. Now
 it declares that the Government in
 appointing him "appears to have
 made a mistake." Continuing, The
 Telegram says that "Major Leon-
 ard's initial work in connection with
 the Transcontinental Railway cer-
 tainly does not give promise of use-
 ful public service. His administra-
 tion of that great enterprise has
 been characterized by gross misuse of
 the large powers which have been
 conferred upon him."

Naturally an endeavor has been
 made to discover the motive for this
 unqualified condemnation of Mr. Bor-
 den's "greatest discovery" by the
 chief Conservative paper of the West.
 The Regina Leader makes a state-
 ment so serious that The Globe
 prints it only under reserve, and
 with the object of directing the at-
 tention of Mr. Borden and Mr. Rogers
 to the fact that such statements are
 in circulation. The Leader says:
 "Hon. Robert Rogers and his
 friends control The Telegram. Mr.
 Rogers is also understood to be in-
 terested in a certain subdivision on
 the outskirts of Winnipeg. Rumor
 has it that when Major Leonard re-
 cently visited the Manitoba city Mr.
 Rogers urged that certain Transcon-
 tinental tracks be extended through
 or near the subdivision.

"No one needs to be told why Mr.
 Rogers would want railway track-
 age brought to the subdivision in
 which he is interested. He wanted
 to increase the value of his holdings
 of course. But Major Leonard did
 not view matters in just the same

light as Mr. Rogers viewed them,
 and the laying of the tracks was
 not ordered. The next point of in-
 terest was the attack upon Major
 Leonard by the newspaper which Mr.
 Rogers controls.

"It looks like a typical Rogers
 play. The Minister of the Interior
 has not been generally looked upon
 as a man who is in politics either
 through any burning desire to ren-
 der service to his country or for the
 benefit of his health. When his news-
 paper makes attacks upon anyone
 connected with the Conservative
 party or holding office under the
 Conservatives, people who know Mr.
 Rogers realize that the attacks do
 not spring from newspaper independ-
 ence of thought, but are moves in
 some Rogers game."

The statements made by The Lead-
 er should have the attention of the
 Premier immediately upon his return
 to Canada. If they are untrue an of-
 ficial denial should be given; if they
 are true Mr. Rogers should be put
 in his place promptly by his colla-
 gues. There must be no building of
 high officials of the Government
 by men like the Minister of the In-
 terior.

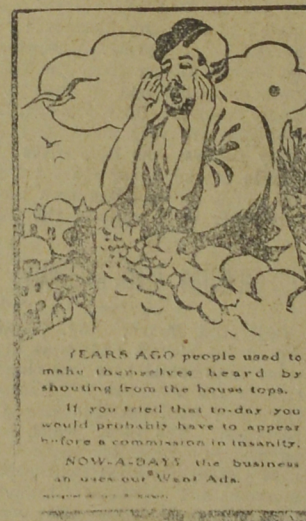
