MONCTON SOLDIERS TORE DOWN FLAG

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 5.—Major S. Boyd Anderson, who was in command of the Moncton Field Battery, recently at Petawawa, explained today the ins and outs of the Matapedia incident which has caused considerable excitement among the American newspapers. He said: "Yes, we did have a flag incident on our return from Petawawa, Ont., but I did not know anything about it until I had been home several days. It appears that the incident happened early in the morning, about five o'clock."

"We were stalled in a siding at Matapedia at about five o'clock in the morning. Some of the boys, looking out, saw the American flag flying on a staff over a fishing club, not by itself, but with the Union Jack flying on the same halyard below it, which is a direct insult to any flag. Naturally the boys resented the insult and some of them, without the knowledge of their officers, who were in bed, rushed across the sward, pulled the two flags down and hauled the Union Jack back flying alone as it should, but laid the American flag on the grass so that the owners could deal with it. A teamster came along belonging to the neighborhood and as he passed, he, I am told, spat on the American flag. He had nothing to do with our company and belonged to the neighborhood."

FORMER MASTER MECHANIC OF THE I. C. R. IS DEAD

Moncton, Aug. 5.—Nelson L. Rand, ex-alderman and one of Moncton's oldest and best known citizens, passed away at five o'clock this afternoon at his home, Campbell street, after an illness lasting from November last.

He was in the sixty-ninth year of his age and had lived in Moncton some thirty-seven years. He was born in Shediac in 1843 and in 1859 he entered the service of the old European & North American Railway from 1866 to 1875 he was locomotive engineer running between Shediac and St. John. In 1875 he came to Moncton as I. C. R. round-house foreman and held that position until 1897 when he was made road foreman. In 1902 he was promoted to master mechanic for the I. C. R. east of Campbellton. In 1909 he retired on pension fund.

Mr. Rand was well known all over the I. C. R. system and had many friends. He was a nephew of the late Rev. Dr. S. T. Rand, of Nova Scotia, and was a second cousin of Sir Charles Tupper. He is survived by a wife and eight children. He was twice married, leaving five children by the second wife as follows: Ivan C., Charles W., Daisy, Minnie and Ruth at home. He was a member of the Masons, Oddfellows and Orange-men. Past year he served at the council board as alderman for Ward three.

HIPPOTRAGUS EQUINUS

In the Mighty Haag Shows Monmoth Zoological Collection which exhibits at Fredericton, August 8 will be found one of the rarest forms of animal life called "Hippotragus Equinus" and is the only living one in America today having been captured by an English war correspondent during the war between the Boers and England. The "Hippotragus Equinus" is of the female sex and is known to the Boers as a species of Gemsbok today extinct. The female is the largest of the two being 4½ feet at the withers and the ears are very large while the mane is small and erect and the horns seldom exceed 36 inches in length. This animal is to be found only in Central South Africa and the Senegal, they have never been very good breeders and it was seldom you would see as many as five together. They are hard fighters like the Buffalo and will not hesitate to attack a person on the last provocation.
