## NEW BRUNSWICK'S NATURAL GAS

New Brunswick's gas and oil industry is the subject of an article in The Canadian Mail, London, July 20th, written by the editor of that journal, who recently made a tour of Canada. He writes in part:

One passenger with whom I had several talks was Dr. J. A. L. Henderson, chairman of the Maritime Oilfields, Ltd., a company which is operating upon a crown lease which is practically perpetual, for oil and natural gas over 10,000 square miles in New Brunswick. Speaking of the work done by the company, Dr. Henderson said:

"We started drilling three years ago, and we have developed an important gas and oil field nine miles south of Moncton. We have proved the existence of four groups of gas and oil bearing sands, the largest being 100 feet thick. The wells are situated from 600 feet to over 3,000 feet apart, thus securing large acreage and long life to each well. There are fifteen large wells varying from 1,315 feet to 1,955 feet in depth. The largest gas well began flowing at the rate of 12,000,000 cubic feet, or about 295 tons of gas a day. The gas pressure is enormous. In the case of the largest well it is over 700 pounds per square inch. The total yield of the fifteen gas wells amounts to over 34,000,000 cubic feet a day.

The gas is of very high quality, being practically the same as that found in the Pennsylvania oilfields of the same geological age and character. It contains no deleterious constituents, it is free from moisture and sulphur, and it possesses great heating and lighting properties. Its calorific value is 1,280 British thermal units per cubic foot, as compared with average coal gas with 755 B. T. U.'s and produced gas with 155 B. T. U.'s per cubic foot. We estimate that reckoning ten cubic feet per horse power hour, with high class gas engines the cost of 100 horse power for one hour is only 1s. The gas can be used equally well for domestic purposes, for gas engines and for industrial purposes.

### VALUE OF THE GAS.

"The value of natural gas is not generally understood. It is unequalled for cheap power production by means of gas engines. In large gas engines the consumption is as low as nine cubic feet per horse power hour. In industries it supersedes coal for all purposes of power, heat and light. It is used most extensively in households for cooking, as well as for lighting.

"At Moncton a subsidiary company has been formed to distribute the gas—the Moncton Tramways, Electricity & Gas Company. The prices charged by that company are as follows: Gas for burning under boilers, 15 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, and for household purposes 38 cents per 1,000 cubic feet. The gas is conveyed to Moncton by a high-pressure main pipe, and is distributed throughout the city. A main pipe line to the town of Hillsboro is now being laid and gas will be supplied to that town in a week or so."

Asked, as to oil, Dr. Henderson said:

"My company has hitherto concentrated its attention upon the development and production of natural gas, but high-grade petroleum oil of paraffin base is produced from several wells and sold locally. We expect to get equally good results from the development of oil as we have from natural gas, which is only the lightest form of petroleum. Considerable deposits of albertite, a petroleum residue with the appearance of coal, exists, and oil springs and outcropping oil sands are encountered in various parts of the territory included in the company's concession."

### A GREAT FUTURE.

Dr. Henderson spoke with confidence as to the future of these oilfields and it will be interesting to watch the development of the little city of Moncton as a result of the enterprise of the company. It is interesting to note that the existence of oil in this district has been known for many years but although a number of test holes had been sunk in the past, nothing of practical value was done until Dr. Henderson took the matter up. To begin with, he told me everyone, even geologists, laughed at the idea that any payable quantity of petroleum and natural gas could be found, but Dr. Henderson has travelled all over the empire with a view to locating oilfields near the sea with which to supply the navy, and he was not to be discouraged when he had formed his own opinion as to the value of these oilfields in New Brunswick.

That he was right is now proved beyond doubt. The ultimate full development of these oilfields will mean a great increase of prosperity to the province, and it is gratifying to know that for once it is British capital and not American that has developed this great enterprise. The development of these oilfields has, however, an importance far beyond their merely local value, for it must be remembered that they are 1,000 miles nearer Great Britain than any other American oilfields, and are
