## THE STEAMER TEXAS SUNK BY A SHELL

Constantinople, May 1.—A telegram by a shipping agency from Smyrna today says that the Archipelago American steamship Company's steamer Texas, which went down in the Gulf of Smyrna, with 140 persons Monday night, was sunk by a shell and not by a mine as was first reported.

The dispatch says that two blank shots were fired first by the Turkish Fortification, warning the vessel that she had strayed from the proper channel but when no notice was taken a shell sent her to the bottom. The version of the steamer's loss is regarded as quite terrible for the authorities had repeatedly warned shipping Companies that their vessels would risk being fired on from the fort if they strayed from the channel marked out for them, when entering or leaving the harbor.

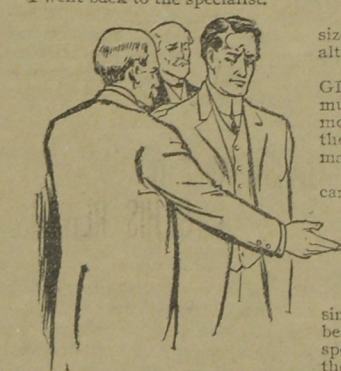
### KNIGHTS TEMPLAR AT MACON

## AUTOMOBILE OWNERS MUST COME TO TIME

The following notice has been sent to automobile owners by the Department of Public Works:

Dear Sir: Enclosed herewith please find a copy of the Motor Vehicle Law as amended at the last session of the Legislature.

I would call your attention to the various changes made in the Act, more especially the change of the date of payment of the annual tax, which you will see upon referring to page 16. Section 9, is payable on or before the 10th day of January in each year, instead of September 1st, as provided in the original Act.

In order that you may avoid being caused any inconvenience through being held up by the authorities for running your car without having your 1912 taxes paid. I would suggest that as the 1912 tax is now due that you would make prompt payment of same to me, and I will be glad to forward the number plates with as little delay as possible.

You will also see by referring to Section 8, (page 15) that there is a penalty imposed upon any owner, who permits a chauffeur to operate his car until satisfied that the chauffeur has paid his annual tax. Of course the production of the official receipt by the chauffeur would be sufficient evidence on this point.

In case you should dispose of your car at any time, by sale or exchange, I would particularly draw your attention to Sub-section (4), of Section 2, (page 5), of the Act, which requires any person who sells or exchanges an automobile, to immediately notify me of the name and address of the new owner, as well as date of transfer, and to return the aluminum seal. This is required in order that the Department here may have a correct record of the registered owners in New Brunswick, and if this provision is not carried out the original owner stands charged with the liability for the annual tax.

## NOVA SCOTIA HUNTER BURNED TO DEATH

Truro, N. S., May 1.—Ralph McCabe a well known resident of Greenfield, near Truro, and one of the famous hunters of this county, with a record of nearly 100 moose to his credit, was burned to death in his barn early this morning along with his stock and most of the contents.

McCabe had been in Truro during the day and in the evening left for his home. What time he arrived there is not known but about 12.30 his wife heard a noise in the barn as if the horse was kicking and upon going out found the barn full of smoke. She saw nothing of her husband and ran to the neighbors for assistance, but nothing could be done to save the barn, and it was burned to the ground.

This morning the remains of McCabe were found under the horse's body his head and shoulders being preserved but the rest of his body as well as that of the horse, burned to a crisp.

## THE MEAT PROBLEM IS WORRYING SYDNEY

(From Sydney Post)

If one can judge by appearances, the time has certainly come when the people of Sydney, will no longer carry the burden of increased cost of living, not, at least, if they can help it. The proceedings of the special meeting of council held last night to look into the matter were watched by a large and intensely interesting crowd. The letter of Mr. S. E. Anglin in Saturday's Record announcing the jump in the price of meat, was the last straw. The public back is not exactly broken, but the public has made its mind that its back will be broken unless some of the load is taken off, and quickly too, and it, manifested that feeling in no uncertain way last night.

### COMPARATIVE PRICES

Mayor Gunn started the proceeding by announcing the object of the meeting. He then went on to read telegrams received from the City clerks of Halifax and St. John, and the town clerk of Amherst and Moncton, whom he has wired for prices. Following are copies of the answers received:—

Halifax, N. B., April 22.

A. D. Gunn, Mayor, Sydney: Jacob Withrow says sirloin roast and steak twenty-two cents, top of round steak twenty cents, rib roast twenty cents, blade roast fifteen cents, chuck roast ten to twelve cents, plate corn beef twelve cents, hind quarter lamb fourteen cents, lamb chops twenty-two cents.

FROM ST. JOHN

Wholesale beef, country, nine cents to eleven one-half. Wholesale beef, Western, eleven and one-half. Retail two. Retail beef, western sixteen beef, country, twelve cents to twenty. (Sgd.) HERBERT WARD ROPER

Common Clerk

FROM AMHERST

Beef, wholesale, ten to eleven, retail, twelve to twenty. Pork, wholesale, nine, retail, twelve to sixteen cents per pound.

FROM MONCTON

Moncton prices, beef, wholesale, nine to eleven cents per lb., retail roasts, fourteen to eighteen, stakes, sixteen to twenty, boils ten. Pork wholesale nine to ten, retail, fourteen to sixteen.

Having read the above the mayor called for discussion.

BACK TO PORRIDGE AND POTATOES

Mr. J. A. McKinnon opened the discussion with a vigorous speech. He called attention to the fact that prices in Sydney for the best cuts, are three cents higher than in any of the other cities named. There was no difference in freight rates to justify such a discrepancy in prices. He laid the blame for the present conditions chiefly at the door of the cold storage people, who combine to put up the prices. The only thing for the council to do was to appoint a committee to make a thorough investigation. If prices did not go down people ought to go back to the porridge and potatoes of their forefathers and refuse to eat meat till more reasonable prices obtained.

### MR. ANGLIN ON THE RACK

Mr. Anglin of the Harris Abattoir Company was present and was asked to offer some explanation for the action of the meat men. He entered into a defence of the wholesaler quoting prices of beef in Toronto to show that prices charged here are not exorbitant.

### DR. THURSTON

Dr. Thurston then took a hand in the discussion. He had inspected 120 head of cattle in North Sydney only the day before of which some eighty were on the way to St. John's Newfoundland. They were bought by a St. John's dealer in open market in Toronto for 54 cents per pound. Before getting them into Newfoundland a duty of 30 per cent. had to be paid and the owner would have to get 133 cents per pound in order to make a fair margin. Yet the best cuts could be bought in St. John's for the same price they are sold here.

### THE REASON

Dr. Thurston then went on to tell the reason. In St. John's there are facilities for handling by-products. In Sydney there are none. The whole difficulty lay in this fact, the doctor thought. If Sydney owned its own abattoir, with facilities for handling by-products, so that cattle could be brought here on the hoof, the question would be solved. Meat could be handled much more cheaply on account of the clear profit from by-products.

All the time Mr. Anglin was subjected to a running fire of questions which he answered as best he could, though evidently not to the satisfaction of the audience. He brought out a laugh by saying he was in sympathy with any movement of this kind and went on to say that people should learn to use cheaper meats.

Too many insisted on having sirloin steak, while cheaper cuts were just as nutritive. He would not repeat this statement, however, when asked to do so by Dr. McLeod, and then Ald. Rudderham broke in with the remark that if everyone eats steak a great part of every carcass must be wasted or steak is cut down to the horns.

### COMMITTEE APPOINTED

The mayor called on any other meat dealers present to join in the discussion, but none responded.

A motion was then made for the appointment of a committee, and carried. The mayor named Aldermen Fitzgerald, Morley and Rudderham as the committee.

The public will await the result of its investigation with interest.

## TWO FISHERMEN ADRIFF FOURTEEN DAYS ON DORY

(Glace Bay Gazette.)

Afloat in an open dory and upon ice-floes for two weeks, almost starved and half frozen to death, two Newfoundland fishermen, George Banes and Archibald Bungay were picked up on Saturday about one hundred miles off the coast and brought into North Sydney Wednesday morning by Captain Spencer of the bark Florence M. The two sailors were removed to Hamilton Hospital in a very precarious condition and it is doubtful if they will recover.

Banes and Bungay, who belong to Poal's Cove, Fortune Bay, were members of the bark T. A. Mahone, of Jersey Harbor, Fortune Bay, and were engaged in trawling on the Grand Banks. Early on Saturday morning, April 13, the two fishermen left their schooner in a dory to attend to their trawls. Fog came up during the afternoon and they lost sight of their ship, although they rowed and rowed for hours in the direction in which they expected to find her. They continued to row all night until the morning sun dispelled the mists that hung over the black waste of waters, but neither their ship nor any other vessel was in sight.

For fourteen long, dreary days and nights the men suffered terribly from want of food and drink and from the cold winds that blew. Part of the time they spent in rowing, hoping and praying for the appearance of a sail which they never sighted. Six days they spent upon the dangerous and treacherous ice-floes repairing their frail boat which had been damaged by ice.

During the day-time and part of the night Banes and Bungay kept themselves from freezing to death by running over the ice-floes, and during the remainder of the night both huddled in the bottom of the boat, hugging each other close for warmth, and securing some little sleep. During all those fourteen days the men suffered terribly from hunger. When they left their schooner they had in their dory a few sea biscuits and a can of water. A hardtack a day was all they allowed themselves, and in a short time their meagre supply was gone, along with the water. Eight days after they became lost from their vessel, and after they were compelled to leave the ice-floes, they sighted an iceberg. Rowing for it, they managed to get upon its base and stayed there for twenty-four hours. Water was secured by catching it as it was melted by the sun from the top of the berg and upon it they managed to sustain life.

After struggling with the pangs of thirst and hunger and being so exhausted from their battle for life, the men at last fell into the bottom of the little boat and gave up the struggle for life and the little boat

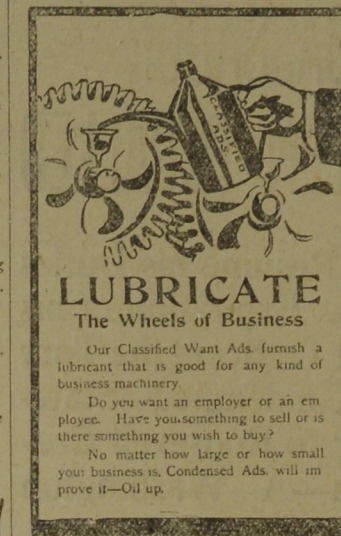

New York, May 3.—A programme of nine interesting competitions has been prepared for the hydro-aeroplane meet to be held on the Hudson River tomorrow under the auspices of the Aero Club of America. drifted where she would. On Saturday the floating dory was discovered by the Florence M., and when picked up Banes and Bungay were found huddled together unconscious. They were taken aboard the schooner and tenderly cared for by Captain Spencer and his crew, and on the vessel's arrival yesterday they were sent at once to the hospital.

One of the rescued sailors is a youth of sixteen or seventeen years of age, and the other is about thirty. Both had their legs and hands terribly frozen and even if they pull through, the physician in attendance believes that their lower limbs will have to be amputated.

In conversation at noon today with Dr. Rhindress of North Sydney, the physician who is attending the two sailors, The Gazette was informed that both men were doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances. The physician was not in a position to state yet whether amputation would be necessary or not.
