Denver, May 1--The Howard Baker-

 ner showed remarkable speed and used
 his left to great advantage. Baker,
 the younger man, hammered Gardner;
 but his blows did not strike any vi-
 tal point, and Gardner came up fresh
 at each gong.

In the sixth, Gardner nearly put
 Baker to the floor. In the seventh
 round it looked very much as though
 Gardner had knocked his man out,
 but Baker came back, and in the
 eighth round had a shade the better
 of the going. The ninth was even,
 and in the 10th both men fought for
 all they were worth. Baker knocked
 Gardner through the ropes, but the
 latter was on his feet immediately
 and the fight closed without a deci-
 sion.

The consensus of opinion among
 the newspaper men at the ringside
 was that the fight was a draw.

 should make a hit with Newark.

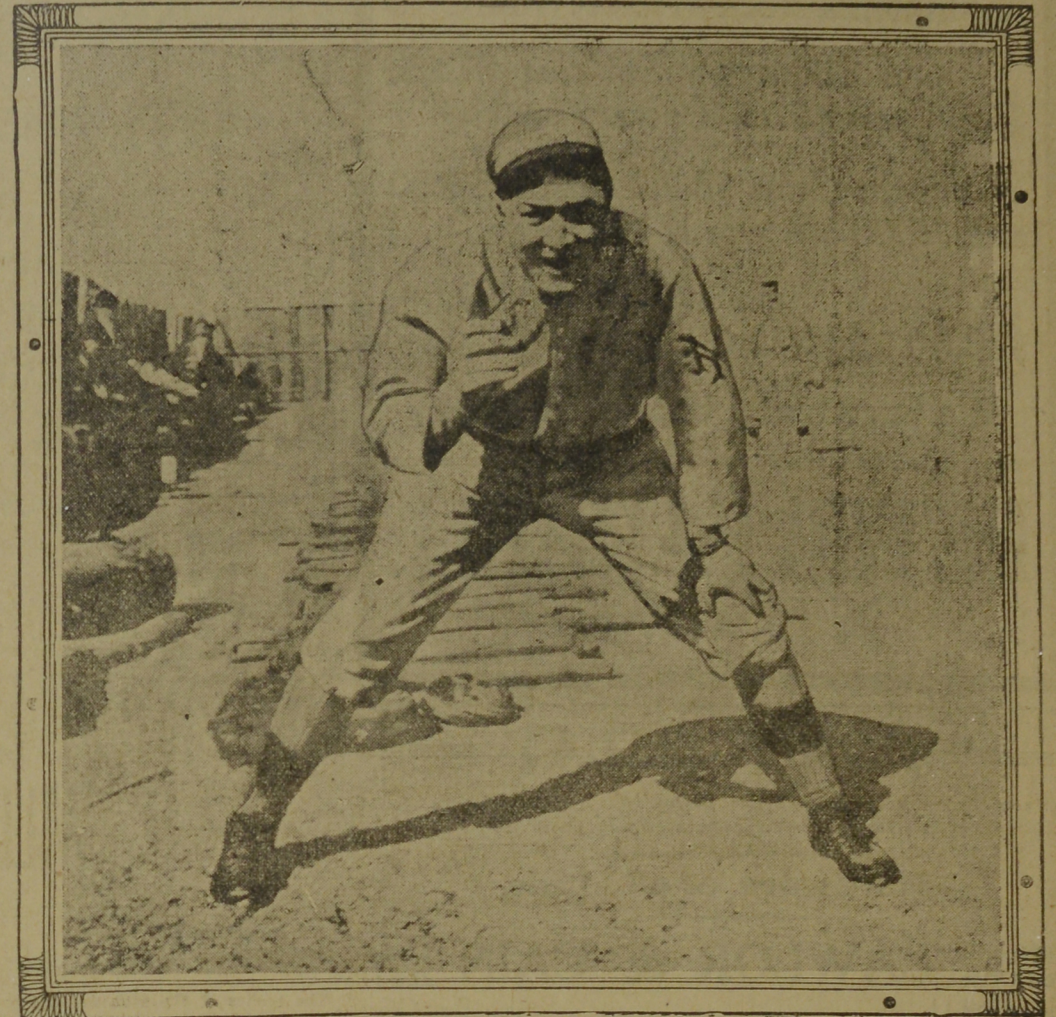
\$10,000 FOR BRITT-BROWN MATCH
