DALLAS VIADUCT OPENED

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 22.—Dallas half-million-dollars viaduct was formally opened today with an elaborate parade and a programme of addresses. The viaduct has been building several years and is regarded as the greatest civil improvement ever undertaken in this city.

GOVERNMENT AXE IS COSTLY WEAPON

Montreal, Feb. 19.—The Conservative party's much-used axe is an expensive weapon, according to D. Henri Beland, ex-postmaster general and M. P. for Deauce. At a meeting of the Montreal Reform Club Saturday evening he declared that with each member of the new Civic Service Commission receiving \$18 a day in fees and expenses, and often taking four days to get from place to place, it sometimes cost the Conservative Government \$72 to "fire" a Liberal earning \$60 a year.

De Beland said the labors of the Conservative Government since it came into power had chiefly been expended in the appointment of commissions, and he declared that the Civil Service Board, ostensibly appointed to devise ways and means for the efficiency of the government service, had been appointed solely that Civil servants' political leanings might be investigated with a view to decapitation if they had been guilty of partisanship.

Dr. Beland endorsed the descriptive phrase of Dr. Clark, of Red Deer, that the government "had its considering cap on," and pointed out that the all important question of the tariff had been entrusted to a commission aggressive action having been shelved for a while, the Hudson Bay Railway question had been shelved because the farmers of the west raised such a protest that contracts awarded by the Liberal government had to be cancelled, the Georgian Bay Canal scheme was shelved too, while the Ne Temere decree which had been considered in a desultory fashion was now to be turned over bag and baggage to the Privy Council for definition.

"MYSTERY LADY" DEAD FROM OLD AGE

Philadelphia, Feb. 20.—Mrs Sarah Keena, the "Mystery Lady" of the Philadelphia Hospital is dead of old age, after sixty-one years spent in that institution. She was taken to the hospital in 1861 suffering from smallpox. She was cured, but during her convalescence lost her memory. To questions as to who she was, or where she came from she simply shook her head.

The gathering of the coal owners indicates that they see a possibility of initiating a peace compromise.

Lethbridge, Feb. 21.—At the convention of miners of district 18 now in session here a lively discussion took place yesterday afternoon on a resolution read from the Michel Local in the mining convention to agree to a general strike on April 1st, as a protest against the manner in which British miners are being treated at present. A ballot was finally taken amid great excitement which killed the resolution by a vote of 38 to 29 to abide by whatever action the international body may take respecting strikes.

TAFT TO ADDRESS NAVY LEAGUE

Washington, Feb. 22.—The seventh annual convention of the Navy League of the United States began today with a pilgrimage of the delegates to the tomb of Washington at Mount Vernon. Later in the day the delegates returned to the city for the annual dinner, which had Secretary of the Navy Meyer, Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood, Rear Admiral Wainwright former Speaker Cannon and a number of other notables scheduled among the speakers and guests. President Taft has accepted an invitation to address the convention at a public meeting tomorrow in Memorial Continental Hall.

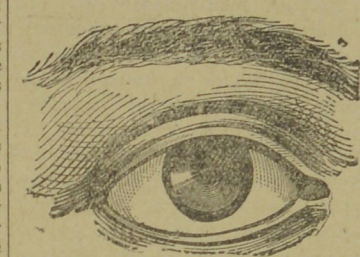

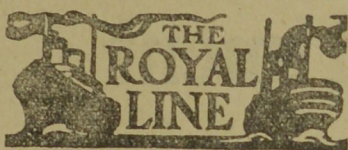
