

The new administration will inaugurate a POLICY FOR
 THE RELIEF AND BETTERMENT OF AGRICULTURE;

By introducing legislation with a view to assisting provin-
 cial farmers, who lack the necessary capital to bring their lands
 up to a satisfactory productiveness, such assistance to be by
 financial aid under proper safeguards, by long term loans upon
 the provincial credit, at a low rate of interest and easy terms of
 repayment, thereby increasing development and production and
 encouraging our farmers and their sons to remain in the pro-
 vince—

By associating a practical farmer with the administration
 of the Department of Agriculture—

By abolishing unnecessary offices in the Department of
 Agriculture so that the appropriations therefor may serve their
 purpose and no longer be largely wasted in the salaries and
 travelling expenses of useless officials—

By aiding the establishment of cheap rural telephone ser-
 vices throughout the province—

We will also remove the administration of the roads abso-
 lutely from politics, and place the expenditure of the road monies
 directly in the hands of the people, thereby abolishing the waste
 of the monies passing through expensive and unnecessary offi-
 cials—

We will provide for the taxing for school purposes of grant-
 ed forest lands lying contiguous to school districts (which now
 escape taxation), thereby improving the schools of remote and
 depopulated sections, and relieving from the present excessive
 rates the farmers who remain upon the land and in these dis-
 tricts—

We will, except in cases of imperative urgency, put up all
 public works to tender and award the contract therefor to the
 lowest bidder—

We will provide in all government contracts, conditions to
 secure the payment of such wages as generally are accepted as
 current in each trade for competent workmen in the district
 where the work is carried out; this to apply also to work under-
 taken by the government, which is done by necessary day's
 work—

We will keep ordinary expenditures of the province within
 the ordinary revenues—

We will undertake a re-survey and valuation of the Crown
 Lands of the province and to provide for the conservation of our
 forest revenue under the direction of scientific foresters—

We will promote and encourage the colonization and settle-
 ment of the Crown Lands, which are adapted to agriculture—

We will amend the mining laws of the province in the in-
 terests of bonafide development and to prevent the holding of
 mineral areas by speculators.

We will not permit any legislation or departmental regu-
 lation to interfere with the customary privileges of the fishermen
 respecting the oysters, clam and quahaug beds along our shores
 or support the creation of any monopoly in such oyster, clam
 or quahaug fisheries to the injury of the small fishermen—

We will introduce legislation to set aside certain streams,
 lakes and rivers, wherein the residents of this province, upon
 the payment of a nominal license fee and subject to proper regu-
 lations, may have the right to fish—

We will give careful attention to the development of the
 various water powers of the province under government control
 with a view to transmitting and supplying electricity at actual
 cost to manufacturers, farmers and others who might with ad-
 vantage, use this modern source of heat and power—

We will no longer permit the granting of these valuable
 water powers and franchises to companies for the purpose of
 private speculation to be held for gain against bonafide manu-
 facturing interests seeking cheap power—

Upon this platform and my criticism of the administration
 I confidently appeal for your support.



FLEMMING ROADS
ARE ROUNDLY
CONDEMNED

Hayesville, June 12—We have been
 reading a lot lately in the papers
 about the roads and bridges through
 York county. We can claim that we
 have the worst road and bridges any-
 where in New Brunswick in any road
 of the same length; starting at the
 forks of the Parker's Ridge Road and
 following up along the Miramichi to
 the head of the settlement, a dis-
 tance of about twelve miles. In this
 distance of road there are five large
 bridges and three of these are not
 safe to drive a horse over. One of
 these in the lower part of the road,
 known as the Pond Bridge, had fence
 rails put up in it over a year ago to
 show people where to guide their
 horses and it remains that way. When
 the Liberals went out of power some
 four years ago, we had the best
 roads and bridges of any settlement
 in York county, but since the Hazen-
 Flemming government have been in
 power we have had nothing done on
 bridges and practically nothing done
 on the roads. I was reading in a
 Fredericton paper where a correspon-
 dent said the road in this section
 was bad for automobilists. I would
 like to see the man who would drive
 one up this main river road; he would
 not be just a common man. It is
 quite a common thing to see a team-
 ster leading his horses by the heads
 driving them in and out of the holes
 in the road. But the provincial elec-
 tions are coming on boys, when Mr.
 Young, M.P.P., with the game warden
 and some of his other friends
 from Parker's Ridge will be out to
 tell us how to vote and of the won-
 derful things they are going to do
 for us. They won't say much about
 what they have done in the last four
 years for the benefit of this part of
 the parish. They will probably speak
 about that costly pile of cedar they
 have at a gulch up at a place known
 as Tim Munn's, which will quite
 likely stay there and rot after the
 election is over. Some of the people
 can be fooled part of the time, some
 all the time. Now, men along this
 river, it is time you wake up. We
 have almost a hundred voters here
 that are paying almost double the
 road tax paid under the Liberal ad-
 ministration. Why should we not
 have bridges that are passable. In
 case you don't know, I can tell you
 one secret of it; if a couple of
 parties on Parker's Ridge who can
 pull a good thing out of the Conser-
 vative government can make the
 party in power believe that their in-
 fluence is so great that they can
 sway the vote here, what need has
 Mr. Young or any of his party to
 look after bridges? But this is one
 time the Conservatives are going to
 get left right here, on the 20th.
 When the ballots are counted they
 will find that broken promises with
 the help of a few government pets
 has left them away back in the shade.

 tion refuses to give the neces-
 sary evidence concerning it.

 at stake in this contest, too
 grave to permit any thought-
 less elector to be influenced by
 bribery, direct or implied.
