Fredericton Cricket Club Lost at St. John

Smith did some great Bowling for Winners--Neild and Whalley for Fredericton Batted well--Local Team Fielded well in First Innings

St. John, June 17--The first of the two annual cricket matches between St. John and Fredericton was played on the Barrack Square on Saturday and resulted in a win for the local eleven by 6 runs on the first innings. Both sides played good cricket notwithstanding a few errors in fielding. Fredericton won the toss and elected to put the home team in. The start was propitious, the first ball going to leg for 4 and the second following suit for 2. Langford and Whalley, the bowlers, however, soon found their length and the score was kept down. Sturdee was responsible for 11 and was the only member of the team to reach double figures. The innings closed for 41.

Fredericton on going in, scored 20 for 1, but under Smith's attack fell to pieces and were all out for 38. Neild contributed ten singles and a 3 and was top scorer for his side. Whalley carried his bat for a well played 10.

At the home team's second venture they offered better resistance to the bowling and ran up 60 before they were dismissed. Tucker, who was permitted by Fredericton to substitute for Sturdee, hit up 13 in good style. Fairweather carried off the honors with a score of 15.

To play out time but with no chance of winning, Fredericton went in and lost 3 wickets for 11 runs. Fredericton's fielding was all to the good in St. John's first innings, but several catches were missed at the second venture. The St. John team was also deficient in this important branch of the game and at least two easy catches were dropped. The visitors were entertained at luncheon in the rooms of the artillery officers.

DECISION AGAINST VANCOUVER

Cincinnati, June 14--The National Baseball Commission handed down a decision in a case today which death had decided previously. The Vancouver club had sold player Lockwood to the Boston club, who paid \$600, the first instalment. They Boston sold him to the Sacramento club, but the player died before reporting to the latter. The Vancouver club asked for \$1400 balance on contract, but the commission holds that Boston paid for the privilege of trying out the player and that the Sacramento club was deprived of this privilege by the act of God.

Owing to a hitch in the weight agreement, at Indianapolis Friday night, the scheduled bout between Young Herman and Johnny Creeley had to be declared off, neither fighter being willing to give in.

DISREPUTABLE TORY CANVASS KNOCKED IN THE HEAD

(St. John Telegraph)

The Standard yesterday tried to assist Mr. H. W. Woods in misrepresenting Senator King's Statement at the Gagetown nomination proceedings in regard to the course of Liberal Senators in voting against the Borden government's highways bill. Mr. Woods, who faces defeat in Queens, and whose party is responsible for the present wretched condition of the New Brunswick roads, is merely trying to escape punishment at the hands of the electors. The amendment for which Senator King and all of the other Liberal senators from the Maritime Provinces voted on March 21 last asked that the following clause be inserted in the bill:

"The sum of money voted in any years to be extended under this act shall be apportioned among, and paid to the several provinces of the Dominion in proportion to the respective populations of such provinces as shown by the next preceding census."

If the Conservatives had accepted that amendment the bill would have gone through, and there was no honest reason for not accepting it. The action of the Liberal senators merely prevented an unscrupulous government from using the appropriation to influence the vote in any one province on the eve of an election.

Electors who read the text of the amendment quoted here will see how foolish is the position occupied by Mr. Woods and the Standard.

BILL KAY BROKE INTO BASEBALL THROUGH HYPNOTISM

Joe Cantillon Bought him and Another Player for \$500 when Talked Asleep by Little Man

Speaking of Bill Kay, who recently was obtained from Newark by Brooklyn, The Brooklyn Eagle has the following:

HOW KAY BROKE IN.

"Kay's advent into the outside world was one of the curiosities of baseball. Joe Cantillon was manager of the Washington team and was loafing around the corridors of the old Regent Hotel there one rainy afternoon when it blew a little man full of nervous energy and enthusiasm, but decidedly not full of rum. Instead, he was full of business. Accompanying him were Kay and another strapping youth, both evidently just in from the wilds. They stood demurely and bashfully in the background while the little man approached Joe and announced that he had two ball players, (Kay and Tompkins), to sell on the hoof and would take \$500 for the pair of them."

"Joe had never seen or heard of any one of the three before and started to say he would not have them for a gift. Up to that time it had never been recorded that Joe, who had run Chicago saloons for years, had given up something for nothing, especially \$500 to any chance stranger who asked for it. But, here he struck a new one. The little man gazed steadily in his eyes and began to talk. He talked so fast that the words became one, as the spokes on a fast moving wheel appear to be one. He heightened the effect by incessantly poking his victim on the third button of his vest with the middle finger of his right hand."

JOE GAVE UP.

"Gradually Joe's eyes took on a glassy stare, instead of his trusty right mauler laying the stranger low. Then the talker led him gently by the hand into the writing room, where Joe obediently took out his checkbook and made out the paper for \$500. Scrutinizing it carefully, the little man hustled out to a bank and in two hours after reaching Washington he was on his way back to West Virginia. His departure was the signal for Joe to come out of his trance. He went into the lobby and there found two rural young men who wanted to know where they were to eat and sleep. He saw it all then, curse the luck, so to speak, and registered them at the Regent. Kay proved to be a good and useful partner. He remained with Washington the rest of the season and part of next, after which he began his tour of the minors, with occasional trials by the majors."
