NORTH SHORE CONSERVATIVES HAMMER THE GOVERNMENT

The following manifesto from the Independent ticket in Northumberland appears in the Conservative Chatham World. "If Mr. Flemming and Mr. Morrissey can extract any comfort from it they are welcome:

TO THE ELECTORS OF NORTHUMBERLAND:

The people of this county have not had a fair opportunity, until now, to express their opinion of the deal that gave the candidates of the opposition convention the government's support. Mr. Swin was nominated by the supporters of the government and the chief commissioner used the government influence to defeat him and elect the opposition candidate.

That was an insult that no self-respecting Conservative can condone. It was a display of one-man boss rule that every self-respecting elector ought to rebuke.

The people did not elect Mr. Morrissey to rule over them, and choose representatives for them.

But instead of calling a convention he selected one of the "lumber lords" he used to assail, and put him for election. He did this without even consulting his colleagues in the county.

And then, when this gentleman retired, the chief commissioner urged Mr. Burchill, whom he had denounced as one of the "corrupt Northumberland deal" to accept a nomination from the Liberal convention and promised him the government support. Mr. Burchill made no advances to him, but volunteered the statement that he would, if elected, sit as an Independent Liberal, a promise that he kept in the house.

Northumberland was disgraced by this foolish proceeding. The county was laughed at. It is still remembered to our discredit.

We will, if elected, support the government so long as its measures commend themselves to us as being in the best interests of the province.

The land-grabbing lumber kings, against whom the people of this county have struggled so long for a share of the public domain, are lining up for the purpose of wresting practically perpetual leases from this government. They are exerting pressure on the government for that purpose, and we ask for election that we may assist the government to resist that pressure and deal out single-handed justice to all. Give the men of small means a chance. Don't lock up the public lands in long

leases to a few capitalists. Let us have fair play all around.

We will do all we can to prevent the threatened land grab and thereby give every lumberman a chance to do business as an independent man. With long leases and the lands of a few, every man who wanted to engage in the lumbering business would have to submit to terms that would deprive him of all chance of legitimate returns for his industry.

We have reasons to believe that the nominees of the office-holders' convention have purchased support by promising to favor the land-grabbing policy, and a denial would be inconsistent with the facts as they are.

Why are the big lumbermen, without regard to politics, supporting the Morrissey ticket, if they are not looking for long leases that will give them a monopoly of the crown lands?

It is not only on land, but in water, that monopoly threatens the men of small means.

The monopolists are planning to get control of the oyster fisheries, and are promising support for promising support for promises of oyster leases.

Long oyster-bed leases will degrade the fishermen, who are now independent and make good wages, into servants for the lessees—servants at low wages.

We will fight against any leasing policy that does not give every man a fair chance.

We will endeavor to have the money that is appropriated for road and bridge purposes spent honestly and fairly, for the benefit of the public at large and not for the few. We believe that public work should be up to tender, so that every citizen may have a chance to compete for it, instead of having it done by a band of personal followers of the chief commissioner.

We will not be tame followers of the government of the day like gentlemen who represented you in the last house, but will be ready at all times to stand up and fight for the rights of the county. The tame follower is no good. He is only a voting machine, and votes as he is bid.

If you want independent representatives, who will work in the interests of the county and not for party or personal interests, we are ready to serve you.

QUESTIONS SUBMITTED IN NE TEMERE CASE.

Montreal, Que., June 14—Questions to be answered by supreme court in Marriage reform on Monday.

(A) Has the parliament of Canada authority to act in whole or in part bill number 3 of the first session of the twelfth parliament of Canada, entitled "An act to amend the marriage act."

(B) If the provisions of the said bill are not within the authority of the parliament of Canada, to enact which, if any of the provisions are within such authority.

2 Does the law of the province of Quebec render null and void unless contracted before a Roman Catholic priest, a marriage which would otherwise be legally and binding, which takes place in such provinces?

A—Between persons who are both Roman Catholics, or between persons one of whom only is a Roman Catholic.

3—If either (A)—or (B)—of the last preceding questions is answered in the affirmative has the parliament of Canada authority to enact that all such marriages whether:
(A)—Here-to-for solemnized, or
(B)—hereafter to be solemnized shall be legal and binding.
The Lancaster Bill, on which the marriage reference was based, provides as follows:
1—The marriage act, chapter 105, of the revised statutes, 1906 is amended by adding thereto the following section.
2—Every ceremony or act of marriage heretofore or hereafter performed by any person authorized to perform any ceremony of marriage by the laws of the place where it is performed and duly performed according to such laws, shall everywhere within Canada be deemed to be a valid marriage, notwithstanding any differences in the religions of the

persons so married and without regard to the religion of the person performing the ceremony.

3—The rights and duties as married people of the respective persons married as aforesaid and of the aforesaid and of the children of such marriage shall be absolute and complete, and no law or canonical decree or custom of or in any province in Canada, shall have any force or effect to invalidate or qualify any such marriage or any of the rights of the said persons or their children in any manner whatsoever."
