MONCTON TAILOR MEETS TRAGIC END

Moncton, Oct. 30—David Duffy, the well known tailor, fell or jumped off Dunlap's wharf about 4.30 this afternoon and was drowned before aid could reach him. Boys saw him sitting on the edge of the wharf and next saw him struggling in the water. They gave the alarm and F. A. McCully, who happened to be on the wharf at the time, and Sergt. Belliveau, who was summoned from the police station, threw planks to the drowning man and secured a boat as quickly as possible.

He was in the water about twenty minutes before he was pulled out and life was extinct.

Dr. Purdy was called and tried to resuscitate the unfortunate man but life had fled. Duffy is said to have been on a spree for several days and whether he fell or deliberately jumped

over the wharf is a question never to be answered, as he was alone at the time. He was about sixty years of age and worked as a tailor for Murdoch McLeod. He formerly was in the employ of E. C. Cole & Co. for a number of years. He was a native of Ireland and unmarried. So far as known he had no relatives in this country. He had lived in Moncton for the last thirty years.

DECISIVE BATTLE NOW BEING FOUGHT

London, Oct. 30—A big battle, perhaps the decisive one, is proceeding somewhere to the east of the line from Constantinople between the Turkish and Bulgarian armies and heavy fighting also is taking place around Adrianople itself. Beyond the fact that a clash has come, the general staffs of the Turkish and Bulgarian armies are keeping the outside world ignorant as to how things are going with them. No news has come through from the scene of action except the despatch from Maxim Pasha, the Turkish commander-in-chief, saying that the position is favorable to the Turks. There are 150,000 troops engaged. While admitting that they have to depend on mere rumors and suppositions, military critics here are inclined to believe that the Turkish army is at last ready to take the offensive and has a chance of retrieving itself. The Bulgarian troops have obviously suffered a check in the vicinity of Adrianople, as despatches from Sofia report the arrival there of many wounded from the front and it is announced that the Bulgarian plan of storming the great fortress has been delayed until reinforcements arrive. The Turkish commander's plan is not clear but it is believed he will attempt to relieve Adrianople and its garrison of 50,000 men while at the same time holding the Bulgarians on his left flank. He seems to take calmly the cutting of the railway between his army and Constantinople. This might indicate that he is obtaining supplies and reinforcements by way of Rodosto or some other point on the sea of Marmora. The rumors that Bulgarian troops had reached the sea are unconfirmed and it is more likely that only raiding bands have gone so far south.

A DREADNOUGHT FOR THE AMERICAN NAVY

New York, Oct. 30—Splashed with the traditional bottle of champagne the great battleship New York was successfully launched today at the Brooklyn Navy Yard. The launching drew to the navy yard a notable gathering of distinguished persons. Among those on the launching platform were Secretary Meyer and other high officials of the Navy Department a congressional delegation, Governor Dix of New York and his staff, Mayor Gaynor and many other invited guests.

The gigantic battleship slid down the tallow-greased ways with the lightness of a frail lifeboat. As the big flag-bedecked hull started towards the water, Miss Elsie Calder, daughter of Representative William M. Calder of Brooklyn, broke a gayly heriboned bottle of wine against the steel prow and spoke words that gave the vessel its name. Miss Calder was attended by Miss Kathleen Fitzgerald, daughter of Representative John J. Fitzgerald, as maid of honor.

The initial plunge of the giant ship into the waters of the East River was the signal for a deafening roar from factory and ship whistles, intermingled with the enthusiastic cheers from the throats of 50,000 spectators. As soon as the big hull reached the water it was hemmed in by a dozen navy tugs and gradually towed to her mooring near Cob dock.

The battleship New York and her sister ship the Texas, now nearing completion at Newport News, will be larger and more powerful than any warships now afloat. It was deemed appropriate that these two exemplars of the highest skill of the shipwright and naval designer should bear the names of two warships which covered themselves with glory during the Spanish-American War.

The New York when in commission will be manned by sixty-three officers and will have a crew of more than 1,000 men. She is 565 feet long, 95 feet 2 1/2 inches beam, so that she will have almost 15 feet to spare in passing through the Panama Canal locks. With all her stores aboard the New York will displace about 23,000 tons, or 1,000 tons more than the largest battleship now flying the American flag.

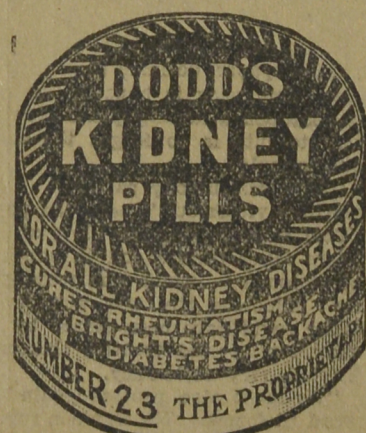
One of the features which attracted the attention of the spectators of the launching was the peculiarly shaped swelling at the bow of the New York. The older ships were fitted with a regular ram bow. While the general ram shape has been retained in the New York it is not so accentuated as in the older ships. The change in design was made on the theory that the ram is not a real necessity, since the fighting in the future is likely to be at great distances. Also, it has been found by experiment with models that the protuberance forward, such as distinguishes the bow of the New York, gives the ship less resistance in the water.

Another notable feature which distinguishes the New York from the present dreadnoughts is the size of the turret guns. Ten 14-inch guns are to be mounted instead of the former 12-inch guns, giving a considerable advantage in fighting quality over the older battleships. The New York will also be fitted with four submerged torpedo tubes and will carry a secondary battery of twenty-one 5-inch rapid-fire guns and ten small guns for boat service and saluting purposes.

The New York and the Texas will be the first ships in the world to carry 14-inch guns. Some of the battleships, of the class of the Oregon, Illinois and Albama, have 13-inch guns, but all of the rest of the American battleships are fitted with the 12-inch guns. The biggest guns now afloat in the British Navy are the 13.5-inch rifles carried by the latest battleships.

The New York will be protected with armor in plenty; not only over her vitals but even the ordinarily exposed ends of the ship. The main armor belt will be about eight feet wide, with an average thickness and will be supplied with ammunition by electrical hoists from the magazines and shellrooms below.

The number and size of the guns in the secondary battery are about double those on the battleships of a decade ago. It is those guns that must be relied upon for very quick work in meeting the attacks of the torpedo boats and fast cruisers. Close subdivision and strong bulkheads will form additional protection against mine and torpedo explosions.

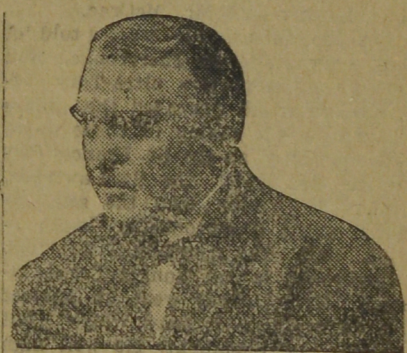
