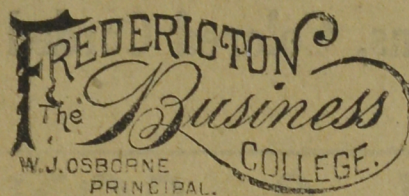

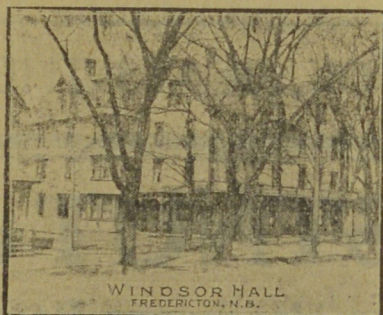

TORY SPOILSMEN NOW
HOLD MONTREAL HARBOR

Ottawa, Oct. 29—The resignation of
Major G. W. Stephens, as President
of the Montreal Harbour Board, has
robbed Canada's greatest harbour of
the greatest harbour expert on this
continent. Mr. Stephens has resign-
ed, following the resignation of his
two colleagues, Messrs. C. C. Bal-
lentyne and L. G. Geoffrion.

During the years they have been in
office they have done more for the
port than was ever done before, and
have transformed it from a dirty,
medieval harbour to a splendidly
equipped modern port. But they
were Liberals, and no matter how
good their work they must go. The
Government apparently was afraid
to openly dismiss them. Even Mr.
Monk withheld his trusty axe. But
from the day the Conservative Gov-
ernment assumed office a determined
effort has been made to oust the
three commissioners and replace
them with Tories. This for two rea-
sons, the commissioners are paid
good salaries so that their dismissal
meant three fat jobs for party
friends. But it meant much more
than this. The Montreal Harbour
Commission has control over thou-
sands of employees of all kinds, from
dockworkers to highly paid engi-
neers, and expends hundreds of thou-
sands of dollars annually. The Har-
bour Commissioners, with the anti-
que idea that they were paid to run
the harbour and pay their employees
to do the real work, clashed with
the modern idea of the Borden Gov-
ernment that jobs were made for
party friends and not for any other
useless purpose such as work. A de-
termined effort began among the
Tories of Quebec Province for the
heads of Messrs. Stephens, Geoffrion
and Ballentyne. All three are
wealthy men with very large busi-
ness interests. Not one of them
has any particular need of the salary
attached to the office, and they un-
dertook the arduous work of remodel-
ling the whole business of the har-
bour more from a sense of patriotic
duty than for personal profit. They
devoted years of incessant labour to
this work, while in at least one in-
stance, more money of his own has
been spent by the occupant of the
office, than his salary amounted to,
in furthering its work.

As soon as the agitation against
them was commenced by the Tory
spoilsmen, the Harbour Commis-
sioners realized that they must make
room for party friends, so that the
Tory Government would once again
make the Harbour Commission a po-
litical machine. The agitation grew,
but the business interests of Mont-
real fought it and representations
were made by the Board of Trade,
the Shipping Federation and La
Chambre de Commerce, to the Gov-
ernment that it would be destruc-
tive to the best interests of the Port
of Montreal to dismiss the three men
who were doing such splendid work
for it. In the face of such influen-
tial representations the efforts of the
job-hunters failed for a time and the
Tory axe was withheld, but the pres-
sure continued. Finding it impos-
sible to at once have the Commis-
sioners dismissed the Conservative
interests kept busy interfering with
the work of the Commissioners with
the idea of making things so dis-
agreeable that they would resign.
The Commissioners announced their
intention of resigning as soon as
their main programme of Harbour
improvement was finished, which
would be in less than a year from
now. This did not satisfy the vorac-
ious appetites of those who wished
to feed at the party trough. The pin-
prick policy was kept up, and now,
in disgust, the three Commissioners
have sent in their resignations. This
can have but one effect—the inter-
ference with the splendid work of har-
bour improvement carried on by
the late Commissioners, political
bosses instead of business manage-
ment and a return to the original
state of affairs under which as a
frank party organization the Har-
bour Board neglected the Harbour
and ran things for political advan-
tage.

It may be a vote producing change
but Montreal and the business of
Canada's greatest port will be the
sufferers.

Despite every effort of the Govern-
ment the riding of Richelieu has re-
mained faithful to Laurier and re-
elected Mr. Vadrin, the Liberal can-
didate by a majority of 301. While
this is a reduction from the majority
secured at the election of September
1911, it is a very satisfactory re-
sult. Richelieu includes the big gov-
ernment shipyards and works at Sorel,
which employ many hundreds of
men. The influence of the
Sorel shipyard was used to induce these men to
support the government candidate

while the manner in which the axe
has been wielded was a pretty strong
hint of what would probably happen
to any employee who dared to vote
Liberal. Despite this Sorel gave a
handsome majority for Mr. Cardin.
And not only were there these handi-
caps to be overcome but a deliberate
attempt was made to bribe the whole
riding by Sir Rodolphe Forget, who
brought his election methods into the
campaign and pledged his word that
if Richelieu elected Morgan, the Con-
servative the Marine Railway would
be voted at the next session, of
course the inference being that if Mr.
Cardin was elected there would be
no vote for this railway, which is
badly needed in the district.

That in face of such bulldozing and
bribery the old riding of Richelieu
should stand firm by Laurier is pre-
tly good proof that the Province of
Quebec is as solid as ever for the
Liberal principles.

The election has a double signifi-
cance, coming so shortly after the
resignation of Hon. F. D. Monk, since
as usual in Quebec the Conservatives
and Nationalists joined hands in an
effort to defeat Mr. Cardin, while Sir
Wilfrid Laurier, when he spoke at
Sorel a few days before the election
denounced Monk and the Nationalists
as unsparingly as he did the Borden
government. It was therefore a de-
cided victory for the Liberals over
the combined Nationalists and Con-
servatives.

VOTING CONTEST

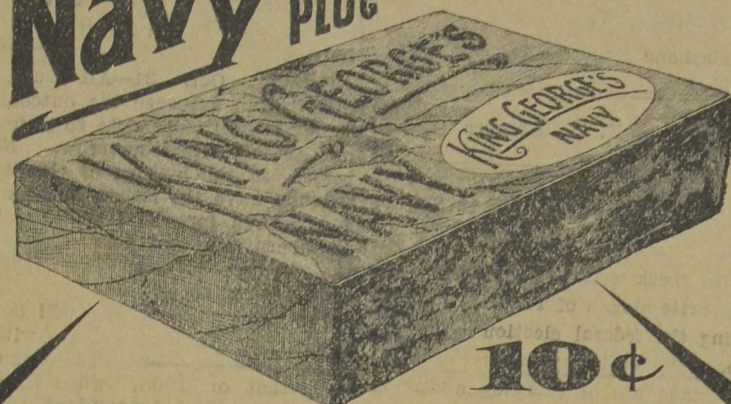
High School still maintains the
