## BULGARIANS REPORTED

## TO HAVE WON

### ADRIANOPLE SURROUNDED.

Sifsa, Oct. 30.—Adrianople is now completely surrounded by the Bulgarians, whose attacks are meeting with great success, according to the Mir. The position of the Turks is critical. There are persistent rumors that the Bulgarian cavalry has reached Rodoste, where the Turks have been landing troops brought from Asia Minor.

### CORDON AROUND SCUTARI.

Reika, Oct. 30.—The Montenegrins have captured an important position on Mount Bardignol, thus completing a cordon around Scutari.

A vigorous bombardment is being maintained daily against Tarabosch, but no decisive progress has been made. Floods on Friday carried away a bridge across the river near Scutari, cutting off from the town 1,000 Turkish troops.

### BULGARIANS WIN GREAT BATTLE

Sifsa, Oct. 31, 1.30 a.m.—After two days' fighting the Bulgarian army has gained a complete victory over the principal Turkish forces. The Turks have retreated in disorder. The town of Lule Burgas has been taken.

Public attention has been centred in the operations around Adrianople and the movements of the Bulgarians against Lule Burgas. This town is an important point in the Turkish second line of defense, which stretches from there westward to Demotica. Its capture would indicate that the second line has been broken. The Turks would then probably retreat to Tchorlu, where they might possibly make a stand.

### MORE TERRIBLE TURKISH ATROCITIES.

Athens, Oct. 30.—New and more terrible Turkish atrocities in twenty Christian villages in the Janina region are officially reported. The villages were destroyed, the inhabitants massacred, women and children being burned alive.

It is also officially reported that three-fourths of the Turkish wounded at the beginning of the fighting were Christians. Now only about one-fourth of the wounded are Christians which is taken to mean that the Christians were placed in the forefront of the battle. Five hundred Greeks enrolled in the Turkish army who managed to desert, have arrived here by way of Trieste. They marched through the streets singing their war songs, and will be placed on the reserves.

### FEAR ANTI-CHRISTIAN OUTBREAKS

Paris, Oct. 30.—Official advices received today from various parts of the Ottoman empire anxiety of the foreign communities over the possibility of anti-Christian outbreaks in the event of further reverses by Turkish troops. The French government has been urgently requested to station warships along the coasts in readiness to take off refugees.

As a matter of precaution the government will dispatch tomorrow additional ships to Beirut, from which port they can readily reach any menaced points.

France and Great Britain are acting together in this matter, Great Britain sending ships to Saloniki.

## FULL CEMENT DUTY TO BE RESTORED

Ottawa, Oct. 30.—Importers of cement will pay full duty tomorrow. Owing to a demand from the west the government on June 1 reduced the duty on cement by half, or rather agreed to return half the duty collected. In effect this reduced the duty from 52 cents a barrel to 26 cents a barrel. There were large importations at the reduced rate and protests were received from the Canadian cement manufacturers. In answer to them, Finance Minister White said they had no cause to complain for taking into consideration the freight rates Canadian cement with a tariff of 26 cents a barrel was 35 per cent, while with the tariff at 52 cents a barrel the protection was 75 per cent. The higher rate goes into effect tomorrow at noon.

### SPECIAL PROTECTION.

The police have been given special instructions to be on the watch tonight as it is Halloween and trouble may be expected.

### ONTARIO FLOUR CHEAPER

All grades of Ontario flour declined twenty-five cents at noon yesterday. There has been no change in Manitoba patents, the price still remaining at \$6.25, while Ontario are now \$5.85. There is a probability that Manitoba patents will go lower, but the market is declared uncertain. It is difficult to foretell just what changes may ensue on account of the complications in the Balkans. The abundant Manitoba harvest had led to the belief that prices would range fairly low this fall, and it is likely to be the case unless the Balkan troubles interfere.

### NEVER TOO LATE.

An interesting event took place last evening in the Carleton Catholic church, when Father O'Donovan united in marriage Philip Gallagher, who is more than seventy years of age, and Miss Susan McCarty, who is fifty. This is the third matrimonial venture for Mr. Gallagher. There was a large bonfire in front of the home of the newly married pair last night, and some of the younger people helped to celebrate the event. Mr. and Mrs. Gallagher will reside at the corner of Sea and Whipple streets, West St. John.
