WANT THE GOVERNMENT TO PROBE FOOD TRUST

(Montreal Herald.)

At a mass meeting on Sunday to protest against the high cost of living in Montreal, the statement was made that the retail price of butter in Montreal had been fixed for the winter at forty-five cents a pound.

Today the cold storage proprietors, while admitting that there was a fairly large amount of butter stored away for the cold weather trade, positively denied any arrangements to hoist the prices.

PASS STRONG RESOLUTIONS. The strong resolution passed on Sunday is today being prepared to be forwarded to Ottawa.

Upwards of two hundred workingmen were present at the Temple of Labor on Sunday afternoon to hear speakers of various nationalities discuss the present cost of living in Montreal, and adopt the strongly worded resolution to be sent to the federal authorities requesting that immediate steps be taken to investigate the existence of a "food trust" or "combine" in the city.

A tremendous sensation was caused when Alderman Blumenthal, whose disclosures through The Herald exclusively have created such a stir positively stated that a member of the local "food trust" had informed him that the price of butter in Montreal had already been fixed for next February and March at forty-five cents a pound retail.

With the exception of Mr. Robert Leech, who spoke in English, and who said the reduced gold standards was responsible for the high cost of living, the speakers at the meeting expressed the unalterable opinion that there was in the city a "food trust" which, if it did not actually exist on paper, was operated through a entente cordiale among the dealers of different classes of foodstuffs.

Alderman Blumenthal said that in Montreal at present people were being over-charged, and heavily over-charged, for goods which were necessary for their daily living.

Discussing the prices of butter, Alderman Blumenthal asked how it was possible that with an output of butter greater by far this year than last that milk, one of the most necessary food commodities of the human race, selling twelve months ago for from seven to eight cents a quart was today eight to ten cents a quart.

Ald. Blumenthal charged that milk dealers, not content with having raised the price of milk and cream, whipped the latter before selling so that the consumer not only had to pay more for what he got, but got a great deal less than what was paid for.

"I know myself," the alderman said, "that this is so. And another thing, I was told not two days ago by a member of the local 'butter trust' that the price of butter had already been fixed for February and March next at forty-five cents a pound."

To prove that a "trust" actually existed in Montreal, Ald. Blumenthal said, could only be accomplished by looking through the papers in the safes and strong boxes of the dealers concerned. They themselves could not do this, but they could at least call upon the government to pry into the private affairs of these men who were holding up prices and deliberately cheating the working man.

Another positive declaration reiterated by Ald. Blumenthal was that the food jobbers met every morning and made prices for that day. The dealers said that there was no trust or combine, but this proved that there was something very deep under the surface which the authorities should immediately investigate.

Taking the price of oysters, Ald. Blumenthal declared that these had become luxuries which could only be afforded by the comparatively rich man. Oysters, he said, sold at \$10 a barrel last year. This year they were \$13 or \$14 a barrel or forty and fifty cents a dozen.

The speaker compared the "trust" food dealers to vampires who squeezed and bled the workingman of every cent they could and in conclusion he called upon the government to heed the prayer and find out whether it was that the food trust which he was convinced did exist in Montreal, intended to starve out the poorer classes by raising and doubling prices until even the cost of bare necessities of life would be beyond their means.

WORKINGMEN WILL STARVE.

Mr. Joseph Miller, in an address spoken in Yiddish, supported Ald. Blumenthal's remarks and said that starvation among the working classes would surely follow if nothing were done to check the upward flight of the prices of foodstuffs.

Mr. Robert Leech, speaking in English, declared that if there was a food trust in the city it was only for the self-protection of the dealers and was here to stay.

Mr. Leech gave it as his opinion that a reduced gold standard was responsible for the high cost of living and pointed out that if there was more gold put into the \$5 gold piece prices would come toppling down, while if the standard of gold in the \$5 piece was reduced prices correspondingly mounted.

Mr. Leech said that gold had a greater value in England than in Canada and for this reason Canadian goods were cheaper in England than in Montreal.

OPPOSITION MEMBERS WERE SHUT OUT

Budapest, Hungary, Oct. 30.—The members of the opposition in the Hungarian parliament when they tried to enter the house today were met by a strong military cordon which completely surrounded the parliament building and prevented their approach. The opposition deputies led by Count Albert Appony, Count Michael Karolyi and Francis Kossuth made an attempt to get through but were forced to retire before doing so they made a violent protest. The dissension in the Hungarian parliament has been continuous since May 12th when Count Tisza was elected a speaker of the house to the universal suffrage which caused great bitterness and led to lower house. Count Tisza's opposition demanded by the opposition has caused great bitterness and led to frequent violent scenes in parliament and rioting in the streets of Budapest. On June 7th Count Tisza narrowly escaped assassination in the house where Deputy Julius K. Ovac fired at him three times. The opposition members were then ejected and the proceedings have been carried on since solely by the members of the government party.

He has been at the head of the Pittsburgh diocese of the Protestant Episcopal Church for thirty years.
