SCHOOL BOARD
CONSIDERS SANITATION
AT HIGH SCHOOL

Special Committee Appointed to Con-
sider Request of Board of Health
---Two Teachers Apply for In-
crease in Salary

The regular meeting of the Board
of School Trustees was held yester-
day when several matters affecting
the schools received attention. Dr.
Atherton, the chairman, is at pre-
sent in California, and Mr. Spurden
was absent from the city. Those
present included Mr. Stirling, Mr.
Weddall, Mr. Sharkey, Dr. Vanwart,
Dr. Crockett, Mrs. Clark and Mrs.
Lynch.

On motion, Mr. Sterling was called
to the chair and a subsequent order
was made placing him at the head of
the Board during the absence of Dr.
Atherton.

The secretary made a report re-
specting financial matters, giving ex-
pression of appreciation of the readi-
ness with which Chairman Calder
made it possible to wipe out most
of the Board's big overdraft at the
bank. An encouraging report was
also made respecting the improved
heating plant in the new Regent
street school building. Under the
present arrangement it is believed a
large saving can be effected in the
fuel bill. He says some truants are
still trying to dodge the officer but
the teachers generally report a good
attendance of pupils.

SANITATION AT HIGH SCHOOL.

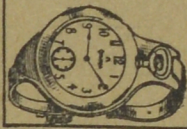
While the members of the Board
and officials seem to have been under
the impression that the most modern
system of heating and ventilation,
known as the Smead-Dowd system,
afforded them and the five hundred
children in the High school building
absolute safety from the contaminat-
ing influences of the olden time, a
letter was read from Secretary Beck-
with of the local Board of Health,
calling the attention of the Trustees
to the unsanitary condition of the
building and asking that early steps
be taken to establish connection with
the city sewer and introduce the flush
system of cleaning. With this com-
munication was a letter from John
O'Neill, city engineer, and also a
letter from Wm. McKay, inspector
of the Board of Health, claiming that
the present system in this building is
unsanitary.

The Board appointed Mr. Weddall
and Dr. Crockett a committee to look
into the matter and report back. At
the close of the meeting the mem-
bers inspected the underground prem-
ises of the High School building.

NO CONTEST IN
MUNICIPAL BY-ELECTION
IN PARISH OF DOUGLAS

Elwood Burt, Burt's Corner, Withdraws
From Contest---Jesse H. Merrithew
of Mouth of Keswick Elected
by Acclamation

Mr. F. St. John Bliss, Secretary
Treasurer of the Municipality of
York, today received notification
from Mr. Elwood Burt of Burt's
Corner that he had withdrawn from
the bye-election to be held in the
Parish of Douglas to fill the vacancy
caused by the death of the late Coun.
George L. Colter. Monday next, No-
vember 4, was set for the day of
election, but on account of the with-
drawal of Mr. Burt, the remaining
candidate Mr. Jesse H. Merrithew of
Mouth of Keswick will be elected by
acclamation.

Mr. Burt at the time that he was
placed in nomination by his friends
stated that he had no time to con-
test an election and in the event of
another candidate being nominated
would withdraw. His business in-
terests demand the attention which
would have to be devoted to can-
vassing and on that account he has
withdrawn.

The new councillor is a farmer, re-
siding at Mouth of Keswick and is
well known throughout the county.
He was nominated previously for the
municipal council, but was not suc-
cessful in election. Mr. Merrithew is
a good speaker and his numerous
friends expect him to make an ex-
cellent representative for the Parish
of Douglas.

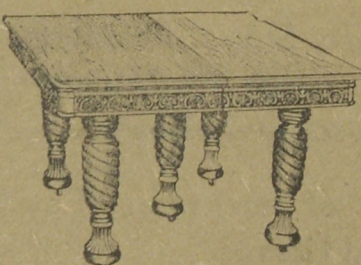

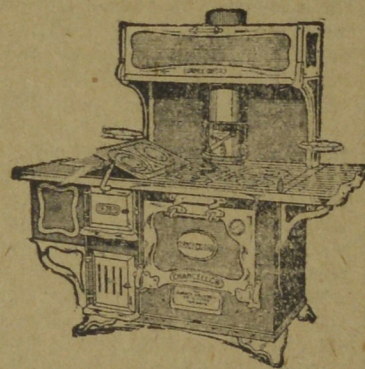
