"You refused to allow it."

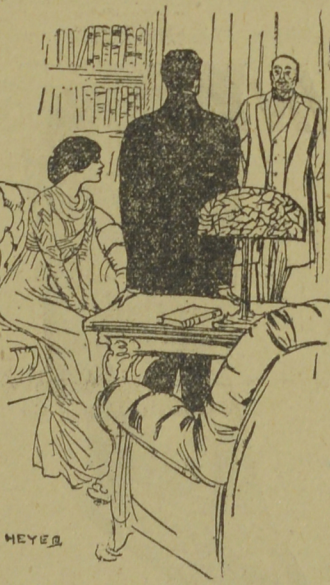

SPRINGHILL MINERS ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

Amherst, N. S., Mar. 24—The Springhill mines were the scene of a distressing accident with fatal results on the afternoon or morning of Friday last, when two employees of the company met their death while at work in one of the mines. The two men were working together in a section of the mine and so far as can be learned, they were buried in a slide of slack coal.

No one saw the accident and the men, whose names are Jabez Graham and Hector McKenzie, were entombed for some hours before their companions missed them. They were both married men with families. Coroner Dr. C. W. Hewson, of Amherst, went to Springhill on Saturday afternoon to hold an inquest and empanelled a jury, who viewed the bodies and then adjourned until Wednesday next. A rigid investigation will be conducted to ascertain what led to the accident.
