ST. JOHN IS AWAKE GREAT BOOM IS ON

St. John, N.B., Feb. 22.—It is difficult to describe the effect in St. John of the announcement that the Dominion government has awarded to Norton Griffiths & Company a contract involving the expenditure of \$11,500,000 on harbor works at East St. John. There had been rumors of delay and much anxiety was felt, but when the news came the effect was electrical. That for which the citizens had hoped, and of which they had dreamed since the days in the early eighties, when they were fighting tenaciously for the recognition of St. John as a winter port, is now to be fully realized. The news arrived late in the afternoon and there was an instant scramble by real estate men to close up deals which had been pending for some weeks. The action of the government in developing the eastern harbor means that St. John is to be the terminal of three transcontinental railways, and that its growth as a commercial city will be rapid and substantial. For it must be remembered that within a month work will be begun upon an 800,000 contract at West St. John, to construct an extensive wharf and sea-wall, and that this will be followed by more wharves from year to year, so that the development of both the eastern and western harbors, between which the peninsula forming the chief portion of the city thrusts itself down, will be carried along at the same time. This will eventually give St. John one of the finest harbors on the whole Atlantic coast, and will bring to its wharves a constantly growing traffic all the year round.

The East St. John works will include a mammoth dry-dock and ship repair plant, as well as the great breakwater, wharves and dredging. Farms close to the new works are being divided into town lots and are now on the market and the street railway will be extended there in the spring and summer.

Hon. William Pugsley, ex-minister of public works, told a St. John paper last week that President Hays, of the Grand Trunk Pacific, said to him that the first steamships to use the terminals at East St. John would no doubt, be those of the white Star Line.

DOCK STRIKE AT GLASGOW SETTLED

New York, Feb. 23.—Settlement of the Dockers Strike at Glasgow, which has tied up shipping there for the past weeks was announced in a cablegram received today by the Anchor Line from the representative at the Scottish port. The cablegram reads: "Labor strike over, work has been resumed and service will go on as heretofore."

Four vessels of the line, the Columbia, Caladonia and Cameronia, plying between Glasgow and this city, Montreal, Halifax, and Portland, Maine, and Boston have been tied up at the docks there because of the strike. The California due to sail tomorrow will be the first ship out of the ports for weeks, officials of the line here declared. Ships of the Allan and Donaldson lines have also been rendered inactive by the strike.

The terms of settlement were not disclosed by the message.

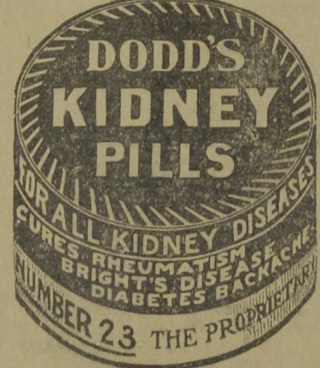

MURDER MYSTERY UNSOLVED

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 24.—It will be three years tomorrow since the murder of Ethel Kinrade furnished Hamilton with the greatest sensation of the kind in its history and added to the criminal annals a mystery that the best detective talent in America has failed to unravel.

Ethel Kinrade, the daughter of an eminently respectable family, was slain in broad daylight in her parents' home in the fashionable section of this city. Her sister, Florence, the only eye-witness of the tragedy, from the first declared that the murderer was a tramp. Though the act appeared incredibly brutal and audacious and the motive inadequate, that version was at first accepted by the authorities. Then discrepancies in Florence Kinrade's story appeared. The actions of her family were inexplicable. The tramp story was soon plausible. The tramp story was soon plausible. The tramp story was soon plausible.

The police inquiry, while it failed to find any trace of the murderer, brought to light a remarkable condition of affairs in the Kinrade family. The investigation showed that Florence Kinrade, of attractive appearance and fond of a gay life, was the pet of the household, while the other daughter, the slain one, was the family drudge. Florence was a concert hall singer and a frequent of gay summer resorts, while Ethel remained at home and did the work. While the others lived in comfort, even luxury, Ethel Kinrade was given a mere closet for a bedroom and a bunk in which to rest.

At the preliminary hearing, Florence Kinrade was subjected to the severest cross-examination, but her story of the tramp remained unshaken and the other members of the family refused to throw any light on the crime. From time to time there have been rumors of possible arrests and only a few weeks ago it was reported that the case was to be re-opened and that a famous detective had discovered a clue to the murderer. But so far as anything is known now, the mystery is likely to remain unsolved and remembered for many years as the most baffling and absorbingly interesting criminal case in the records of Canadian crime.

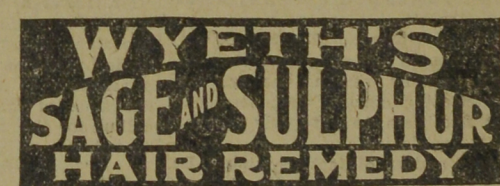
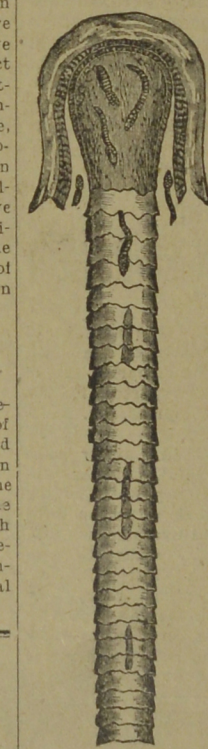

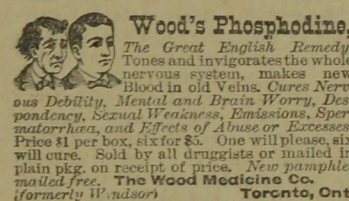
AMERICAN GIRLS MAROONED IN MEXICO
