## HIGHWAY LEGISLATION DISCUSSED AT OTTAWA

(Continued from page one.)

presented this bill in its imperfect form to the House in order to make campaign material for the South Renfrew by-election. (Liberal cheers) The ministers who had campaigned in that riding had laid great stress on it, and they had secured an answer to that method of campaigning. (Received Liberal applause.)

"The premier," added Dr. Pugsley, "admits that this bill ought to contain the provisions set forth in the amendment of the Liberal leader. Why then, does he not now put them in?"

It was silly for Mr. Borden to talk about obstruction. Why did he not adopt the amendment he confessed

should have been incorporated in the bill, and proceed with the legislation?

Mr. Lennox thought the apportionment should be made according to the requirements of the various provinces, rather than upon their population, while Mr. MacDonald, Pictou, pointed out that the provinces were now spending a considerable portion of their respective subsidies in road improvement, and the proposal of the amendment would accordingly meet with their approval.

After some further discussion, the amendment was declared lost on division, and the House went into committee on the bill.

### J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEW

St. John, Feb. 24.—The stock market has been very dull and inactive this week with very few changes. What little movement has transpired has been a decline in a few of the more speculative stocks, particularly in Reading and Union Pacific.

Just at present the market is in a waiting attitude, paying more attention to political speeches than to anything else, though it does not seem apparent that even such radical utterances as those of Mr. Roosevelt, are likely to have any material effect on stock values. In fact, the market has got into pretty much the same rut as that of six months ago, when transactions were at a maximum and there was practically no movement.

#### MONEY.

The money market is very quiet, with rates unchanged from last week. The Bank of England statement is strong and its rate unchanged. The feature of the money market is the continued borrowing demand from Europe for American money, which has caused a slight firmness in the international rate. Beyond this there is practically no change.

#### BONDS.

Unlike the stock market, the bond and investment market has been quite active of late. A great many issues have been placed and have met with favorable receptions. The tendency of prices is steady and the investment market has almost the appearance of a move in the higher grades of securities which generally precedes active speculation in stocks.

#### MONTREAL.

The market this week has been very quiet and fluctuating in very narrow limits, with prices just steady, and cannot see anything to get it out of this rut until the foreign markets begin to show more activity and more settled conditions in regard to strike

news, which at the moment looks as if it might turn out very seriously.

There has been nothing very special in the regular list, but in the unlisted departments there has been a little more activity lately and Canada Light and Power Bonds and stocks have shown an improvement. Spanish River and Wayagamack have also been taken in hand at advanced prices.

Dominion Canners. This stock has shown some signs of improvement in price, no doubt due to the fact that at their annual meeting the beginning of next month the long looked for dividend will be declared. We understand they are doing a good business and will show a good statement.

New York, N.Y., Feb. 24.—The market opening was fairly active but with loss of good sized fractions in nearly all active issues. Modification of the resolution for investigation of monetary affairs was something of a factor, but the chief cause of the setback was that Friday's rise had driven in scattered shorts and weakened the market's technical position. U. S. Steel sold off to 59½. The selling was not particularly noteworthy, but the technical position of the stock did not appear to be strong.

## N. B. DAIRY SCHOOL TO OPEN MARCH 10 Ten Days' Course in Butter-making at Sussex—Cheese-making Course to Begin April 12

The next session of the New Brunswick Dairy School will open at Sussex on March 19th next, when there will first be a ten days' course in butter making both for creamery and home butter makers, with a full course of lectures upon the production and care of milk and cream, covering the selection, testing, care and feeding of dairy cattle as well as the prevention of and remedies for common ailments. Instruction will be given in the care and operation of hand and factory separators and for those who desire it, there will be training in soft cheese making for home dairies.

During this course, to which ladies are especially invited, lectures upon the production and marketing of poultry and eggs will be given by Seth Jones, Provincial Poultry Superintendent. Lectures upon animal and field husbandry will be given by Professor E. S. Archibald and on Veterinary Science by Prof. John Standish, both of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. This course will close on the 29th March, and on the 2nd April a course in cheese making will begin continuing till April 12th. During both courses, instruction in milk testing will be given. It is expected that all those who are intending to operate creameries or cheese factories will attend one or both of these courses. Tuition is free and board can be obtained at reasonable rates.

The staff in addition to the special lecturers above mentioned, will consist of C. W. McDougall, Superintendent and Lecturer; L. C. Daigle, instructor in milk testing and cheese making; George Hanson, instructor on Hand Separators; Albert Conrad, instructor in butter making. Applications stating which course the applicant desires to take, should be sent to C. W. McDougall, Supt. Sussex, N. B., from whom all information may be obtained.

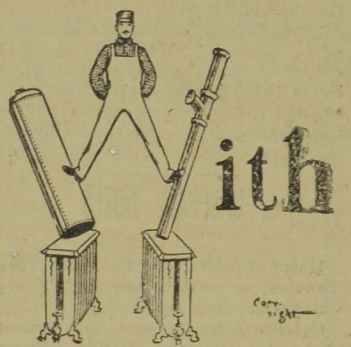
